In the doubleheader staged between the Nationals and the White Sox at Comiskey Park in Chicago, as the result of Thursday's postponement by rain, Walter Johnson, star slapper of the former, was defeated at the hands of the white legged athletes, and Harry Harper came across in the second fray of the bargain day bill for the Washington lads, who won this contest by the score of 8 to 3.

The difference between the White Sox and Boston Red Sox, lately ousted by the former from their place as league's leaders, was widened by a half a game yesterday, as the White Sox broke even with Washington, and Boston was humbled by the Brownies of St. Louis, who have a consecutive winning streak now of fourteen games and look as if nothing could stop them. The Brownies are now tied with the Nationals for sixth place.

The Yanks seem to be slated to drop some more games and although they were setting the pace in this league a short while ago seem ready to drop from fourth, the place they now occupy, and take a position in the second division.

Who gets their place in the first division should they take a drop is the question. If the Nationals would have it they will have to make a pretty hot scramble for it, as those Brownies are hitting the pill with a vengeance that promises to carry them even further than fourteen straight wins. The league's record is seventeen, established several years ago by the Nationals.
