EXCEEDED SPEED LAW SHOOTER'S HILL ROAD EXTOLS DOMESTIC LIFE

Fairfaxan Assessed Ten Dollars in Part of King Street Extended Since the Police Court This Morning

There were but two cases on the docket of the Police Court this morning. A resident of Fairfax county had been arrested by Officer Snellings charged with exceeding the speed law while operating his automobile within the city limits. According to the officer, the accused shot eastward on King street at an early hour this morning at a speed of between thirty and thirty-five miles an hour attracting general attention and causing people on the street at the time to approach the officer and enter complaint. The officer was unable to intercept the man at the time, but awaited his return, when he placed him under arrest. The Fairfaxan left \$10 collateral for his appearance at nine o'clock, at which time he appeared in the Police Court. After Officer Snellings had made his statement, the Fairfaxan asked the privilege of conducting his own case. He was told by the court that, as an American citizen, he could act as his own lawyer. He then requested permission to cross-question the officer, asking him how he knew he passed over a square in less than eighteen seconds, and whether or not he produced a watch and timed him. The officer reiterated his statement to the effect that the speed of the machine attracted general attention. The court then asked the accused if he could say he was not making over twelve miles an hour. The Fairfaxan acknowledged he could not. The usual fine of \$10 was then assessed. As was stated in the Gazette this week, the excessive rate of speed made by some automobilists in this city is a chronic complaint, and the police are endeavoring to bring the practice to a stop. The other case on the docket was that of a man who had violated the traffic law. He forfeited his collateral by failing to appear.

Annexation to City of Alexandria

Alexandria expects to see a modern highway in the place of the part of the King street road from the end of the vitrified street at the Union station to Janney's lane, 3,000 feet west, within six weeks, as it is expected that the work of grading and macadamizing this roadway will be completed about October 1. The concreting is well under way.

Work is being done on the road under the direction of city Engineer E. C. Dunn, and the road is closed directly at the head of the vitrified paving of upper King street, at the Union station, causing automobiles and other vehicles to make a detour around the field on the right to proceed on the main avenue through Rosemont.

When completed, the highway will be 19 feet wide. The surface will be of asphalt macadam on a 5-inch base of concrete, and will be one of the needed improvements in the annexed territory.

SPIDER ELECTS WILSON

Spins His Name in Web as Was Done for McKinley in 1896.

Charleston, Va., Aug. 19. -- The quadrennial spider prophecy has been made and this year it elects Woodrow Wilson. At the home of Mrs. Thomas Field a yellow spider about an inch in length has been weaving its silken skein over a bedroom window. The spider started at the circumference of the web, zig-zagged its way to the centre, leaving in its wake the frosted letters, "W. Wilson." Some of the letters were cut as clean as though made by an engraver.

Mrs. Field recalls the election of President McKinley in 1896, when "Presidential" spiders were plentiful and they all spelled out "William McKinley."

A sudden flare up of Austrian activity on the Trentino front during the last 24 hours, indicative of an offensive movement to create a diversion from the Italian attacks on the Isonzo, is reported. All attacks and raids were repulsed, however, the Italian statement says: Gen. Cadorna's big guns continue without pause to batter the heights east of Gorizia to clear the way to Trieste. Large masses of infantry are hurled forward against the Austrian position.


Bids Wanted For Coal and Wood.
