

HOW SOLDIERS CAN VOTE

Alexandrians on the Border Can Send Their Ballots to This City by Mail.

The possibility of the absence from Alexandria of the members of the 1st Light Infantry, now encamped at Brownsville, Texas, on election day, has caused considerable speculation as to whether or not the voters, who are now in the United States service, will be allowed to exercise their right of suffrage in the presidential election.

It is pointed out that the qualified voters in the companies will be able to vote by mail if they make proper arrangements in time, should the government decide to keep the troops stationed on the border until after election. To be able to vote by mail, the soldiers will be required to notify the registrars in their respective precincts thirty days prior to the election. Ballots will be prepared by the electoral board and furnished to the registrars in sealed envelopes and the registrars will forward them with instructions to the voters.

The ballots will be opened in the presence of either the postmaster at Brownsville or the commanding officers of each company and at the same time will be filled out and sealed ready to be forwarded to the registrars. Upon receipt of the ballots the registrars will turn them over to the judges of the election on election day to be deposited in the boxes with the other ballots.

LATE WM. F. MEADE.

Rev. S. A. Wallis, D. D., of the Episcopal Theological Seminary, conducted funeral services for the late William Francis Meade, who was killed by a train in Richmond Monday, yesterday afternoon in Wheatley's chapel. A detail of ten men from the Richmond Blues, of which Meade was a member, under Corporal E. R. Richardson, acted as pall bearers and escorted the body to Ivy Hill Cemetery, where burial took place. Meade, who lived in this city up to a short time ago and was killed with Meade, was buried yesterday in Richmond at 11 o'clock with military honors, interment being in Hollywood Cemetery, Richmond.

GETS PEEP OF HEAVEN

Evangelist Gibson Delivers Address on Scenes Around the Throne Eternal.

"A Vision of God's Throne," was the subject of the discourse delivered at the gospel tent last night by Evangelist F. E. Gibson.

The Elder said in part—"That God the Father has His throne in the third heaven or the paradise of God; and that his kingdom ruleth over the whole universe." As the Psalmist David says—"The Lord is in his holy temple, the Lord's throne is in heaven."

The prophet John was taken to heaven in visio mand had the privilege of seeing God's throne—Jesus said to him, "Come up hither, and I will shew thee things which must be hereafter." He saw God sitting upon His throne, and he that sat was a look upon like a jasper and a sapphire stone; and there was a rainbow round about the throne, in sight like unto an emerald. And round about the throne were four and twenty seats; and upon the seats I saw four and twenty elders sitting, clothed in white raiment; and they had on their heads crowns of gold." These elders spoken of are representatives of the different nations of this earth, who have been purified through the blood of the lamb. These were taken to heaven with Christ when he ascended up on high, when a cloud received him out of their sight, when two men stood by the disciples in white apparel; which also said, "Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." Were those who came out of the graves after his resurrection, and went into the holy city, and appeared unto many, went up with Christ, into heaven. These four and twenty are assistants around God's throne, helping him in governing this world of ours. Then John saw the four and twenty, or as other translations read our living creatures which were redeemed from the earth. These no doubt are four of the leading prophets of God's people who have been redeemed and taken to heaven, through the blood of the Lamb. "They rest not day and night, saying, Holy, holy, holy, Lord God almighty, which was, and is, and is to come." The four and twenty elders also worship God—saying, "Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honor and power; for thou has created all things, and for thy pleasure they are and were created."

The fifth chapter of Revelation tells us about a book written within and sealed with seven seals, and no man in heaven, nor in earth, neither under the earth, was able to open the book, neither to look thereon.

John then wept much, because no man was found worthy to open, and to read the book, neither to look thereon." But one of the elders said to the prophet John, "Weep not; behold, the Lion of the tribe of Juda, the Root of David, hath prevailed to open the book, and to loose the seven seals thereof." We should thank God for the Christ which he gave us, who has all wisdom and complete sight, so that he has opened the seals and made us to understand these wonderful truths contained in the Revelation. John also saw the number of Angels around the throne of God, which was an innumerable company of Angels.

Much Unnecessary Blowing, But Often Alarms Are Not Heard When Needed.

Complaint is often made that persons operating automobiles in this city neglect to sound their horns when approaching street intersections, and often careful pedestrians find machines in close proximity to them, they having noiselessly overtaken them. On the other hand, joy riders and others often sound their horns unnecessarily, sending forth incessant blasts as they pass through the streets when nothing is in their way.

The people of Richmond are taking exceptions to the actions of some of the autoists of that city in making day and night hideous by continuous blasts as they pass through the streets Richmond papers says:

"It is about time for the Mayor and Chief of Police to revise the Police Department's ruling as to automobile horns, for the sake of the city's peace and quiet. Every variety of siren, moan, screech, howl and scream that mechanical ingenuity can contrive and human inconsiderateness produce is heard all over the city at all hours of the day and night, and no effort is made by the police to put an end to, or even control, the nuisance."

COLLECTS STATUTE LAWS.

Mr. Lewis Machen, Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, announces that he has just completed a collection of the statute laws in force in all the States and in Alaska, Porto Rico, Hawaii and the Philippines. These codes and acts will be kept up to date and used by the Bureau in compiling bulletins prepared by the Bureau between sessions of the legislature and in drafting bills for the members when they are in session.
