

VIRGINIA NEWS

Paragraphs Picked Up Here and There Throughout the State.

K. W. Curlee, an employee of the Dupont Company, at City Point, died this week at Hopewell under suspicious circumstances. The cause of death was a blood clot on the brain, the result of a blow said to have been received in a quarrel with another man over a woman, said to have taken place in a house on Railroad avenue. Curlee was taken unconscious to a hospital where he died after an operation. Pending an investigation the Hopewell police arrested Wm. Terry and A. N. Tadley on suspicion.

In a street fight, the cause of which is unknown to the police, Wesley Harrison, colored, was shot and killed by a negro said to have been James Hopkins in Richmond yesterday afternoon. The murderer fled from the scene immediately after the shooting and has not been captured.

Senator Claude A. Swanson has announced that he has named A. M. Oden as his private secretary, to succeed George P. Mundy, who died a few days ago. Frank Bradberry, of this city, will be his assistant.

In compliance with an order issued by Commissioner Benjamin L. Purcell, of the State Dairy and Food Department, proprietors of soda fountains throughout the State will today begin either to use sterilization methods for the cleansing of glasses after use or will furnish their customers with individual drinking cups. The individual cups will be destroyed after being used once.

A white stranger, fairly well dressed and about thirty-five years old, whose identity has not yet been established, was found early yesterday morning in an unconscious condition with his skull fractured, on the side of the railroad track at Reams, in Dinwiddie County. The sum of \$35 was found in his pockets, but no papers giving a clue to his identity. The supposition is that he attempted to board a train at Reams and was knocked down.

Judge Henry C. McDowell, sitting in the Federal Court in Lynchburg this week, rejected the plea of Charles Quinto, aged twenty years, who charged himself with robbing a post office near Coeburn, Wise County, in 1914, and the boy was sent from the court with some kindly advice. The young man recently became a convert to religion in West Virginia, where he was working and decided to give himself up to the Federal government. The case was laid before the court and Quinto pleaded to be sent to prison, declaring his act had nearly distracted him and he "wanted to take his medicine."

Captain Thomas S. Baldwin, head of the Atlantic Coast Aeronautical Station, has announced that Pilot Victor Carlstrom will fly from Buffalo to Newport News within the next week in an attempt to establish a world's cross-country flight record. Carlstrom will be accompanied by Alan R. Hawley, president of the Aero Club of America. The flight will be made as soon as weather conditions permit, Captain Baldwin said.



eight others in the middle of the floor, Haggerty fired four shots, all of which took effect.

Breaking the silence she has maintained since shooting J. Leland Kempler, in the fashionable Terrace apartments in Baltimore Tuesday night, Sara Conway, nineteen years old and pretty, in a police station cell yesterday told the story of her relations with Kempler, and accused him of causing her downfall. The girl is a member of a well-known family of Walbrook, a suburb of Baltimore. Twice, according to Miss Conway, after living at Kempler's apartment, she underwent criminal operations. She says she is in a delicate condition now, and because of her refusal again to undergo an operation Kempler rejected her. Kempler is a native of New Albany, Ind. He is in a critical condition in a hospital.

M. Dimitrakopoulos, former minister of justice of Greece, strong friend of the entente and bitter antagonist of what he has denounced as the "wobbly" policy of the Greek war cabinets, is now premier of Greece. Simultaneous with this news from Athens came a semi-official dispatch that Greece will be found actively on the allies side "perhaps within forty-eight hours."

Miss Grace Nevins, a prominent suffragist, was found dead in her apartment in New York yesterday. The police reported the case as one of suicide, attributable, probably, to ill health.

Construction of a tunnel under the Bosphorus is being discussed at Constantinople. Engineers' plans show that the project is feasible and financially profitable, and its strategic importance is obvious.

Sweeping victories for Gov. Edward F. Dunne, Democrat, and former Representative Frank O. Lowden, Republican, for their respective parties' nomination for governor; the apparent defeat of former Senator William Lorimer for a Republican congressional nomination and several close fights for representatives at large and the Republican attorney general's nomination

characterized the Illinois primary yesterday.

Stefan Lanigan, 5-years-old, of Winfield, Queens county, N. Y., was missed from the house Wednesday and his mother and sister began looking for him. After two hours' search, in which the neighbors helped, some one thought of the rain barrel. There Stefan was found, his feet protruding from the top. He had stood upon a box to peer in and had lost his balance.

Mrs. Anne Howe, President Wilson's sister, who is gravely ill at New London, Conn., failed steadily yesterday.

The Agenzia Libera of Rome states that Field Marshal von Hindenburg has curbed Emperor William's habit of giving military commands by advising him to confine his activities to visiting the wounded and delivering speeches.

Unless the car strike is settled by Saturday, every one of the 75,000 trades unionists in New York connected in any way with transportation facilities will walk out. They will be ordered to quit work on Monday. This threat was made yesterday by J. P. Holland, president of the State Federation of Labor, in an address he delivered in Union Square. William R. Fitzgerald, general organizer of the Amalgamated Association, made a similar threat in a statement. At the Union Square meeting Holland said: "The workers of the building trades unions, plumbers, and many others are ready to go on a sympathetic strike. The match is ready. If nothing has been done by Saturday, a strike that will astonish the city will be called."

Condemned as having forfeited her right to live under laws of Tennessee "murderous Mary," the big elephant heading the quintette with Spark's shows, was put to death by hanging yesterday, at Erwin, Tenn. A railway derrick was used. Heavy chains were looped about the elephant's neck and the steam op-

erated crane lifted the massive form into the air. The animal struggled for quite a while before death finally resulted from strangulation. The showmen are said to have admitted that "Mary" had slain her eighth man, her last victim being Walter Eldridge, a Virginian, who was forced to death at Kingsport Tuesday last. Showmen valued the animal at \$8,000.

Fire last night completely destroyed the Pacific Coast Company's liner Congress, 2 miles off Coos Bay bar, Oregon. Several vessels, which rushed to her assistance in response to distress calls, helped remove her 253 passengers and crew of 170. It is believed that no lives were lost.

"Pardon me, but did you drop that bill?" queried a stranger to Michael O'Hara, as he pointed to a \$1 bill on the floor of a cafe, in St. Louis. O'Hara stooped over to pick up the bill, at the same time thanking the stranger. A few seconds later he discovered that while stooping over he had been robbed of a purse and \$29 from his hip pocket. The stranger had disappeared.

Elsie Sacrey, the 16 year old girl who was shot at Seventh and D streets, southwest, Washington, Tuesday night, died at Emergency Hospital yesterday afternoon. Young Grinder was brought into Police Court yesterday and a formal charge of assault with intent to kill was placed against him. He sticks to the story that the discharge of the gun was an accident, and that he had no intention of shooting the girl.

Six persons were killed yesterday afternoon during a test of an ammonia tank just installed in the new plant of the Interstate Milk and Cream Company, at Newark, N. J.
