## THE LATE MRS. EICHBERG

Aged Resident Buried Yesterday in Hebrew Cemetery in Presence of Large Gathering

In the presence of a large gathering composed of many relatives and friends, not alone of Alexandria, but from practically every section of the country, Mrs. Babette Eichberg, one of Alexandria's oldest and most respected citizens, who died last Wednesday afternoon, was buried yesterday afternoon in the Hebrew Cemetery.

The services at the late home of Mrs. Eichberg, 114 north Washington street as also those at the graveside were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Abram Simon, of Washington. They were very impressive and in keeping with the life of Mrs. Eichberg, who was noted for her philanthropy and benevolence, not alone among members of her own faith, but in connection with those of all other denominations.

The pall bearers were: General C. H. Lauchheimer, of the United States Marine Corps, Washington; Jake Lauchheimer, of Baltimore, and Samuel Schwarz, of Washington, nephews of the deceased; Samuel Feldeneimer, of Kansas City and Bernard W. Ehrman and Max Rosenfeld, both of this city, sons-in-law of Mrs. Eichberg.

## ALEXANDRIA BOYS LOSE

But Maroon and White Boys Put up Good Fight—They are not Discouraged.

In a hard fought game of football at Front Royal, Va., on Saturday, the Alexandria High School Football team was forced to succumb to a 6 to 0 defeat, at the hands of the team of the Randolph-Macon Academy.

Although the score was 6 to 0 against them the Alexandria boys clearly out-played their opponents at every stage of the game. It was simply a case where the best team was beaten through no merit of its opponents, but through failure to take advantage of their own gain.

R. M. A. made only three first downs throughout the entire game while A. H. S. made nine. Alexandria three times marched down the field and threatened their opponents' goal while R. M. A. only once came within kicking distance of the Alexandrian goal. This was in the third quarter when, as a result of a touch back and an incomplete forward pass R. M. A. got the ball over the white and maroon first yard line and carried it across on a fake end-play, making their only substantial gain of the game.

In the fourth quarter the Alexandrians again started their march down the field, but were stopped when their opponents twenty yard line by the time-keeper's whistle ending the game.

Those accompanying the team to Front Royal were Professors Blanton and Nolley and the Misses Sarah Cox, Sarah Kemper, Louise Adams, Ruth LeHew, and Susie Murphy.

The boys are all confident that they will meet better fortune when they line up, Wednesday afternoon, on the High School Field, against the Washington Western High School team.

Clarence Padgett, the 12 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry C. Padgett, 311 north Pitt street, who was struck yesterday by an automobile driven by Mrs. John W. The boy was taken to the Alexandria hospital where his bruises and cut over the eye were dressed by Doctors Samuel Moore and T. Marshall Jones.
