

HUMAN TORCH

Man Saturates Clothing With Kerosene and Applies Mith.

Philadelphia, Oct. 6.—Saturating his clothing and hair with kerosene, last night when wrapping heavy bed-clothing which he soaked with the oil about his body, Harry Friedman, 26 years old, applied a match and then leaped from a third-story window of his father's home, at No. 420 South Sixth street. The flaming mass dropped to the pavement almost at the feet of two men living in the neighborhood. Believing a burning mattress had been thrown from the bedroom, the men were about to push it into the street when they heard a groan.

With pieces of carpets and bagging they beat out the flames and then tore the smouldering clothing from the would-be suicide's body. Friedman was placed in an automobile and sent to the Pennsylvania Hospital, where it was found he had been burned from head to foot, and had also fractured his skull when he struck the pavement. He died shortly after reaching the hospital.

CONFIRMS CAPTURE

German U-Boat Bremen to be Used by English.

Newport News, Va., Oct. 6.—Corroboration of the statement recently given out by a British steamer captain reaching New York to the effect that the German commercial submarine Bremen, bound from Germany for the United States, had been captured in a net in the English Channel, was given here yesterday by Capt. Reavley, of the British steamer North Point, now in port.

The Bremen was raised by the British, according to Capt. Reavley, and will be put in condition for use against her former owners.

The capture of the Bremen was made about seven weeks ago, when the North Point was in the English Channel, said Capt. Reavley.

A charter has been granted by the State Corporation Commission to the Osborn Investment Company, Incorporated, Rosslyn, Alexandria county, with a maximum capital stock of \$50,000 and a minimum of \$15,000 the par value of which is \$100 a share.
