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THE WAY THEY DO IT NOW.

Representative-elect O. D. Bleakley, of Pennsylvania, arrived in Washington at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon from Philadelphia in an air machine.

"Mr. Bleakley is 60 years old, and it is said he intends, when the weather will permit to use an air machine in traveling from Washington to his home."

The above will bring to mind reminiscences of the early history of the United States. One President-elect, we read, quietly rode on a horse, unaccompanied, from his rural home to Washington when the time for his inauguration drew near.

Three-quarters of a century ago, before the day of railroads, telegraph or steamboats, people were compelled to travel and transact business upon lines but slightly improved since the days of Julius Caesar.

If any one had prophesied in those days that a time would come when Congressmen could make the trip from their homes in a few hours by an aerial journey, he would have been regarded as a fit subject for a lunatic asylum.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

There must be something more in this deportation to Germany of Belgium's able-bodied population than appears on the surface. It is worth nothing that the classes exempted—or which appear to be exempted—are in the main the noncombatant classes.

The Richmond Times-Dispatch in commenting upon this strange German movement, says, one must go back to the exploits of Roman conquerors, or to the triumphs of Vandal and Goth, to find a fitting parallel to the atrocity now being committed under the orders of the Kaiser.

It hardly seems possible that Germany would risk another outburst of world litigation without grave cause, and even Germany must have understood the world would bitterly resent this latest outrage.

If Germany plans to quit Belgium, she will want to leave there no man capable of bearing arms or of making substantial contribution to the economic and industrial support of

the allied forces. To attain this end she may be willing to remove agricultural laborers from Belgium fields and workmen from Belgium shops and so add substantially to the mouths she must feed at home, but any lesser purpose would not seem to justify the step she is taking.

MAY CLOSE THE JAIL

The jailer of Richmond may soon find himself an Othello without an occupation, according to the Richmond Virginian, which observes that since the new prohibition law went into effect a big change has come over the city.

Owing to the lack of patronage the city jail, may have to be closed within the next few days. One-half of the jail has already been closed because of the fact that only a few prisoners are now incarcerated in the prison.

According to City Sergeant John L. Satterfield, he has lost 120 prisoners over and above the number received this month. He asserts that he is discharging about four to every one received. One month ago there were 290 men and women locked up in jail, while at the present time there are only 170.

BUNCOING POLAND

As a cotemporary observes, it becomes more and more evident that the Austro-German creation of a Polish kingdom was merely a device to fill the depleted ranks of the Teutonic armies. Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, in fact, has told a committee of the Reichstag that the promise was only conditional.

To raise this army, voluntary enlistment is to be tried first and compulsory second; if both fail, the promise of an independent Poland will be withdrawn.

BRYAN OPENS CAMPAIGN

Chicago, Nov. 21—On the heels of heavy political campaigning, William Jennings Bryan plunged into his four-year prohibition fight yesterday with an address before the Chicago Dry Federation.


