great Irish mass meeting in Cooper Union. More than twenty-five men and six women were ejected forcibly from the hall. It required nine policemen to throw out one little frail, fighting woman.

As Mayor Mitchel, one of the speakers of the evening, entered the hall there was an outburst of jeering and hooting and chorus of hisses. The mayor's speech was halted every few moments by demonstrations, and no one could get the gist of the address. "Put him out, throw him out," yelled a woman who leaped into a chair as the mayor began to speak. Twenty-five policemen and a large number of detectives surrounding the crowd and ordered silence. Some one knocked the chair from beneath the woman and a fight followed. A flying wedge tore open the crowd, and the inter-upter was almost reached, when she was carried out by nine policemen, kicking and cratching.

The Mayor closed his address abruptly, and under cover of the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner," left the hall.

"I am a lawyer and a business man," shouted the man who took the platform, waving a set of resolutions he desired passed. Another riot followed and the speaker was thrown out. The man later said he was Richard T. Dalton of Long Island City.

Another woman, screaming and fighting, was carried out by policemen. A general battle followed. Police reserves, seventy strong, arrived on the scene in a few minutes. Waving their nightsticks the reserves called on all of the 1,500 in the hall to take their seats. More than a score were thrown out by the reserves.

Amid the chorus of hisses and cheers, resolutions finally were passed endorsing the passage by Congress of the selective conscription act.

The meeting was called by a poster headed: "Irish Americans, awake to your duty."

A delegation from thirty Irish societies, representing thirty-two counties in Ireland, marched to the hall. They were led by the band of the Sixty-ninth Regiment playing the "Rocky Road to Dublin."
