

**NEWS OF THE DAY**

When the allies forced the abdication of Constantine as King of Greece they offered him \$100,000 a year for the living expenses of himself and family.

Figures and bombastic oratory will be tabooed this coming Fourth of July if the recommendation of the committee on public information of the District of Columbia is followed. "This coming Fourth of July," the statement issued by the committee urges, "should be observed throughout the land in a spirit which recalls all the significance of the day. Noise and useless illumination have no proper place in times such as these. It would be utter futility to prepare our nation for the tasks which confront it by firecrackers, skyrockets and rhetorical boasting."

One man killed and a score injured was the toll in Sunday's conflict between Sinn Feiners and the police in Cork, Ireland. Serious disorders occurred, including an attack on the jail in an effort to liberate the political prisoners detained there and attacks on various military recruiting quarters in the center of the town.

There was sharp fighting Sunday between the Teutons and the Russians on the battle fronts in southeastern Galicia and in the Carpathian Mountains.

American naval gunners successfully fought off a big German submarine which attacked an American passenger liner off the coast of Ireland Sunday night. A torpedo fired by the submarine missed its target by less than 20 feet.

Twelve more militant suffragists were registered on the police blotter in Washington late yesterday afternoon, following the most serious conflict between the women and the police which has occurred since the

A number of civil, mechanical and electrical engineers who are delegates to the Zionist Convention met in Baltimore yesterday morning and organized themselves into the Zionist Society of Engineers for the purpose of lending their technical ability to the work of developing Palestine along national lines.

The Argentine steamship Toro was reported yesterday to have been torpedoed and sunk by a submarine off Gibraltar.

A dispatch from Amsterdam says that leading German newspapers are protesting angrily against Chancellor von Bethmann Hollweg's decision to allow them to use only 44 per cent of their former quantity of paper. The Tageblatt, the Tages Zeitung and the Rundschau, of Berlin, charge

the chancellor with attempting to kill the German press. The Cologne Gazette says the blow is a deadly one for the German newspapers, which probably will soon cease to exist.

Floating wreckage was all that greeted an American destroyer which answered a wireless call from a British merchantman attacked by a submarine yesterday morning. The warship was ninety miles away when the first signal was caught. Another message said: "Abandoning ship."

When the vessel arrived on the scene only wreckage remained. The wireless said there were fifty members of the crew on the ship attacked.

Control of American exports, authorized in a clause of the espionage bill, was assumed yesterday by President Wilson with the appointment of an exports council comprising the

Secretaries of State, Agriculture and Commerce and Food Administrator Hoover. An executive order creating the council directs the Department of Commerce to administer all details of operation.

The body of an unidentified man, about 22 years old, whose heart has been cut out, was found in a room in the West End of Boston yesterday. The victim had been stabbed several times in the throat. His heart had been cut out from his breast and was on the floor beside the bed where the body was found. Four young men, apparently forgers, had occupied the room since June 14.

Members of the crew of a British steamer which arrived at an Atlantic port yesterday reported having sunk an attacking German submarine. The British vessel sent a shell into the U-boat's magazine, causing an explosion which parted the undersea boat about amidships. Each end sank separately. The British steamer was uninjured. The submarine was five miles distant and running away after having attacked the Britisher nearly 400 miles off the coast of Ireland.

Chester Sawyer, colored, accused of attacking a white woman, was taken from jail at Galveston, Texas, and hanged near the city limits. The mob, composed of only a few men, entered the jail by a ruse and then overpowered the jailer.

Germany has imposed a fine of \$50,000,000 on the occupied territory of Roumania.

The Canadians are knocking at the gates of Lens again. Since April 14 they have been virtually in the outskirts of the queen city of France's mining district. They have kept their grip on it against all Teuton counterattacks and in the face of steady shelling. On Sunday night they served a painful reminder on the Germans that they have come not only to stay where they are but to take the city. In a brilliant nocturnal charge the Dominion troops stormed 400 yards of a German first line trench and held it fast. It was another local but important step toward the investment of Lens.

The President has designated the period, June 23 to June 30, next, as recruiting week for the regular army and calls upon unmarried men between the ages of 18 and 40 years, who have no dependents and who are not engaged in pursuits vitally necessary to the prosecution of the war, to present themselves for enlistment during the week herein designated to the number of 70,000.

Miss Katherine Stinson, the daring aviatrix, who brought the first Red Cross contribution from Buffalo to Washington to deliver to Secretary McAdoo, appeared over Washington yesterday afternoon just as the sun was disappearing behind the horizon, and after gracefully circling over the city in the big Curtiss biplane, made a spectacular landing on the polo grounds in Potomac park, where a throng of more than a thousand people received her with cheers.
