NEWS OF THE DAY

Burned about the whole body, Albert Kues, 17, yesterday afternoon was rushed to the Casualty Hospital, Washington, where it was stated that his recovery was doubtful. Kues was in the act of lighting a cigarette, when his clothes which was saturated with gasoline, caught fire and enveloped him in flame. At the time the youth was working at his place of employment, an automobile accessory shop at 200 Florida avenue northwest.

The Belgian government has issued a gray book refuting allegations against Belgian civilians contained in the German white book of May, 1915, in which it was said Belgian civilians savagely attacked German troops in the early days of the war and that the measures adopted by the Germans were necessary in the interest of preservation of the German army. According to the gray book, between 40,000 and 50,000 houses were destroyed by the Germans.

Joseph Castelli, 24, and Francesco Vetre, 25, were hanged early yesterday at Hartford, Conn., for the murder of Castelli's wife, Annie, in New Haven, April 23, 1916. The men were convicted of luring Mrs. Castelli to New Haven, where the husband killed her by striking her in the head with an iron bar.

Instead of being a happy bride Mlle. Martha Patrie, a cabaret dancer of New York, grieves over the suicide of her fiancé, a handsome lieutenant of the Russian navy. Lieut. Kurkucukov knew the girl but a few days, wooed madly and gained her consent to marriage. The wedding was set for 8 o'clock Thursday night and the lieutenant had invited several friends to witness the ceremony. The dancer was late and the lieutenant fretted. When chided he drew a pistol and sent a bullet in his heart. Ten minutes later the dancer arrived.

John Dunbar Wright, of New York, was killed instantly yesterday when the automobile which he was driving skidded into a telegraph pole and overturned on the road between Middletown and Port Jervis, New York. He was crushed under the car.

Inquiry by a special House committee into the remarks of Representative Hefflin of Alabama in connection with reports that German money had been used to influence Congress was completed yesterday in one short session and a report will be made today. In effect the report is expected to repeat what Mr. Hefflin has said many times—that he has no direct evidence of wrongdoing against any member of Congress—and add that there is nothing to investigate. Hefflin made this explanation again yesterday before the committee.

A Belgian official communication says: "Zele, in eastern Flanders, has been fined \$20,000 for the giving of food and cigarettes to passing English prisoners. Furthermore, all houses must be shut up at 6 o'clock in the evening which nobody is to be allowed in the streets."

The Merchants' and Manufacturers' Association of Baltimore, yesterday sent a telegram to Vice President Marshall and the two United States Senators from Maryland, requesting that the Senate expel Senator Robert M. La Follette for his unpatriotic acts and utterances.

Defying the Democratic Congress Premier Kerensky has framed a coalition cabinet. The congress had issued an ultimatum to him to the effect that no action must be taken without the full co-operation and consent of the Congress.

MUST STEP UP TO OFFICE

Taxpayers Warned to Make Returns Without Being Sent For.

Washington, Oct. 6.—Notice to the public to make its tax returns to the Government under the new War Revenue law was issued last night by Internal Revenue Commission Roper, in an interpretative statement of the law's operation. Warning was given that in no case would the Government take the initiative in getting in returns, although all returns would be verified and that everybody concerned should communicate promptly with the nearest revenue office. Persons failing to make returns, Mr. Roper announced, will be regarded as tax evaders and penalties will be enforced against them. As outlined in the statement, the following persons are affected and must make returns to the Government.

All individuals receiving incomes of more than \$1,000 a year.

All corporations, joint stock companies and associations.

All distillers, rectifiers, wholesalers and retailers, holders of distilled spirits intended for sale or to be used for manufacturing purposes.

All dealers in fermented liquors or malt liquors, wines, cordials, liquors, domestic and imported.

All dealers in soft drinks, table waters and carbonic acid gas.

All manufacturers of and dealers in cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, snuff and cigarette papers.

All carriers of freight, express or passengers, and all operators of pipe lines.

All dealers in life, marine, inland, fire and casualty insurance.

All manufacturers and wholesale dealers in motor vehicles of every kind, musical instruments, motion picture films, jewelry, boats, sporting goods, perfumes, cosmetics, medicinal preparations, chewing gum and cameras.

All proprietors of amusement places, including cabarets.

All persons executing legal documents of any type.

All trailers on produce or stock exchanges and boards of trade.

All importers of merchandise.

All manufacturers or importers of tailor cards.

MALTREAT PRISONERS.

German System Aimed at Annihilation of French Race, is Belief.

German atrocities upon French war prisoners, and the anxiety with which France is looking to the United States, are vividly portrayed in a letter received yesterday by Prof. Francesco Ventresca, translator in the War Department, from Prof. Henri Bresse, near the Jura Mountains. Chomard and Ventresca in early manhood taught in German schools together.

"According to a German official report, published a year ago, 10,000 of our soldiers were then filling the frame asylums of Germany.

"Under all sorts of pretexts they are inflicting terrible reprisals. Last year they sent 20,000 to Russian Poland. This year they sent 25,000 to the French front, where they were exposed to fire from our guns. They were packed in barracks too small to afford comfort and had no fire. They were not allowed to receive parcels from home and were made to work about 100 yards behind the German first lines.

"Of the 25,000 nearly 7,500 were killed by our projectiles or perished from disease. The others were taken back to Germany in a pitiful condition, crippled for the rest of their lives.

"It is a question of the future of our race, which Germany seems to want to annihilate."

BERNSTORFF'S MACHINATIONS.

Received Quarter of a Million Through Deutsche Bank.

New York, Oct. 6.—Count Johann Heinrich von Bernstorff, then Imperial German Ambassador to the United States, received some time in 1916 from the Deutsche Bank in Berlin a quarter of a million dollars which may become the object of a new investigation either by the New United States Secret Service. This sum is separate from the \$2,000,000 sent here by the German foreign office through the same Berlin bank for Bolo Pasha, the French corruption paymaster.

"About the same time Count von Bernstorff had \$5,000 and then \$10,000 paid to one "Mr. Kramer," of Paterson, N. J.. To these two payments also, considerable mystery attaches.

These new traces, leading, it is believed, to the heart of the ramifications of German government "slush" fund in operations in this country were uncovered voluntarily by Hugo Schmidt, accredited representative in America of the Deutsche Bank.

Washington, Oct. 6.—The State

Department last night adduced direct proof that the \$1,700,000 which Bolo Pasha sent to France for the corruption of the French press came from Berlin foreign office on the order of Ambassador von Bernstorff. The Department made public the exchange of telegrams between Bernstorff and Gottlieb von Jagow, the then German minister of foreign affairs, through which the expenditure was authorized—as "a loan" to bring about peace in an enemy country.

SCENE IN COURT.

Woman Shoots Negro Minister Who Had Murdered Her Husband.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 6.—In revenge for the killing of her husband, Arthur N. Dorsett, a city detective, Mrs. Anna Dorsett Thursday night in the crowded Jackson county criminal court room shot and seriously wounded William David Jones, a negro minister, who was on trial for the murder of the officer.

"Thank God now I am avenged," Mrs. Dorsett cried.

"Get him again," urged Mrs. Helen Schaffer, Mrs. Dorsett's sister, when the negro, still alive, rolled over under a table and she, too, attempted to fire a shot. Officers in the courtroom disarmed the woman and placed Mrs. Dorsett under arrest on a charge of assault with intent to kill. She was released on a \$2,000 bond.

Order was restored in the courtroom and within thirty minutes the jury returned a verdict of guilty against Jones providing for a sentence of 50 years in the State penitentiary.

Officer Dorsett, with a fellow detective, John Clifford, was shot by Jones on the night of August 6 while investigating the alleged theft by the negro preacher of a dog.

BAR TO SAILING VESSELS

Move to Prevent U-Boats Taking Supplies From Ships.

Germany's submarines, practically driven out of the North Sea are recently operating off the French-Spanish coasts seeking American vessels, will have to move to another field.

This was disclosed yesterday through information received by members of the Shipping Board in connection with the order issued last Saturday to sailing vessels that they would not be permitted to go through the submarine zone. When the order went out many vessels were far out to sea. Wireless messages were sent for them to return and they have been picked up by convoys and are now safely back in port.

German submarines, it became known, have been lying in wait for such American ships and taking their supplies.

With the barring of the zone to the slow-going prey, the submarines will again have to keep in touch with their actual bases.

The faster moving steamers, with their gun crews, are not such easy victims as the sailing vessels.

TWO YEARS FOR EXEMPTORS

Members of New York Draft Board Sentenced for Graft.

New York, Oct. 6.—Maximum prison sentences of two years each were imposed in the Federal Court yesterday upon Dr. Henry Seligman, physician of a Brooklyn draft board, and Nathan Ehrlich and Lazarus Jacobson, clerks, as penalty for recently exempting a man examined for the draft. Seligman, in addition, was fined \$3,000.
