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**NO SUPERFLUOUS WORDS**  
Clemenceau Lays Down the Law to German Representatives  
Trianon Palace, Versailles, May 8.—All eyes were fixed upon the shaggy, zizoustachéd pugnaeous face of Clemenceau in the presiding seat at the tribunal of civilization yesterday. One—two—three, tolls a steeple bell. The man in the presiding chair rises with calm, deliberate dignity. "The session is open."  
Again this foe of phrases ascends the diplomatic world steeped in superfluous verbiage. For that is all he says by way of calling history's most momentous gathering to order. First it is almost like a shock to many of the veteran statesmen; then all seem to have a sigh of relief. His directness and simplicity were reminiscent of the way he opened the first session of the Supreme War Council in the darkest hour of the conflict, when Koch was made allied generalissimo. The man who wasted no words in the war would not squander sophistries in making peace.  
In a flash all eyes switched from France's "Tiger" to the door, flung wide open y two liveried attendants. One by one the names of Germany's

delegates were announced as they entered.  
The last one in, Clemenceau began in French:  
"Gentlemen, Plenipotentiaries of the "It is neither the time nor the place for superfluous words."  
Then the venerable prime minister of France "laid down the law" to the German representatives.  
"We have come to settle our accounts," was one of his crisp sentences. His speech had in it a touch of grimness and here and there it contained a subtle emphasis of the think they can bargain with the victors; that the treaty in its essentials is, as far as the allies are concerned, final.  
He told them almost in so many words to "put their complaints in writing" and gave them fifteen days in which to make up their minds, promising every facility and the "courtesy that is the privilege of civilized nations." Their observations, he said, must be written in French and English.  
As soon as he had finished, the French premier handed a khaki-bound copy of the treaty to M. Dutasta, secretary general of the conference, who, in turn, presented it to Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, assuring him he and his colleagues could have as many more as would be needed.

**UNIONS ARE ACCUSED**  
Labor Agents Dominate Employment Service Board is Charged  
New Orleans, May 8.—A resolution protesting against rehabilitation of the United States employment service and urging a Congressional investigation of its operations was adopted by the Southern Metal Trades Association in session here. The resolution, copies of which were ordered sent to members of Congress, charges misuse of Governmental authority by the Department of Labor in the operation of the employment service and says in part:  
"It has been clearly established that the employment service has been dominated by agents of labor unions and the said service conducted in the sole interests of unionism, forming less than 3 per cent of the population of the United States and to the detriment of other interests."  
William T. Harding of Raleigh, N. C., was elected president of the association.


