

CREW OF CAR SHOT

Pole Pulled From Wire by Bandits, Who Empty Revolvers at the Motorman and Conductor

Alhantown, Pa., Sept. 16.—As the result of a daring hold-up of a trolley car early Sunday, Motorman Victor Bachman, aged 35, with a wife and three children, is dying in the Allentown Hospital, and Conductor John Gaston, aged 22, is confined to his home at Coplay. The men were bringing home the last car from Egypt, when the trolley pole suddenly flew off and the car, containing seven passengers, was plunged in darkness at a lonely spot, flanked by cornfields. The bandits had stretched a wire from a pole to a tree to throw off the trolley pole, and, lest this fail, also had tampered with a bond wire to blow out a fuse.

Motorman Bachman ran to the rear of the car to place the trolley on the wire when he was confronted with a masked man, who thought him the conductor and demanded his money. Bachman tried to overpower the thug who emptied his .32-calibre revolver. One bullet hit Bachman over the heart but was deflected by a rib. Another entered his back through his left hand and also was deflected. One went through his left hand, another through his left upper arm and a fifth grazed his neck.

Conductor Gaston yelled to the passengers to hide their money, at the same time hiding his own receipts of \$9 and his gold watch in the sand box and saving them. Then, seizing a switch-iron, he ran back through the car to aid his wounded motorman. As he reached the rear platform another masked outlaw fired from the front platform, tearing away the third finger of Gaston's right hand. Gaston pulled the air whistle, which was heard for miles, and the highwayman fled. The heroic crew managed to take two miles into Coplay, still sounding the whistle, and aid soon reached them.

BERGER ATTACKS WILSON

Victor Berger, Milwaukee Socialist, made his final argument for his right to a seat in the House before the House Elections Committee yesterday. It was a bitter denunciation of President Wilson, the league of nations, the Attorney General, the courts that convicted him of violating the espionage act, and the capitalists.

He declared that the change of mind of the President which caused the United States to declare war "was brought about by certain capitalist interests."

Berger declared that he was convicted by a hand picked jury in Chicago, approved by the American Protective League.

"Members of Congress would have been as guilty of espionage for their utterances. They were protected because they were members of Congress," declared Berger.

Berger then claimed that speeches of Champ Clark, Claude Kitchen, James R. Mann, Representative Mondell and William E. Mason would be in that class.

STRIKERS DISCHARGED

Quit Work to Enforce Their Demand For a Saturday Half Holiday

New York, Sept. 16.—Thousands of shipyard workers who quit work in Brooklyn, Staten Island and New Jersey yesterday, Saturday noon, in an attempt to enforce a demand for

a Saturday half holiday found themselves discharged when they reported for work yesterday.

At the Morse Drydock and Repair Company plant 625 men who participated in the week-end strike were told that their services were no longer required. Two thousand men were reported out at the yards of James Shewan Sons and 1,300 at the Tebo yacht basin. Similar conditions were reported at the other yards. The discharged workmen have started picketing at some of the yards.

WARSHIPS FLOATED

Washington, Sept. 16.—Acting Secretary of State Phillips received a dispatch from London yesterday stating that as a result of the ef-

orts to raise the German vessels scuttled at Scapa Flow, the battleship Baden, the cruisers Frankfort, Nuremberg and Emden, and 15 destroyers have been floated and three other destroyers probably will be raised.
