WOMEN BARRED FROM JOBS.

Women were barred from 60 per cent of the government positions for which examinations were held in the first half of this year, according to a report made public yesterday by the Woman's Bureau of the Department of Labor. More than 260 types of positions were covered in the examinations, and in addition women were not permitted to compete for 16 per cent of the clerical positions.

The full report will be completed in several weeks, according to Miss Mary Anderson, director of the Woman's Bureau. It covers investigations which have been in progress for more than a month, in response to a request by the Federal Employees at their recent convention in San Francisco that a study be made of all conditions of employment of women in the Federal service. The second section of the report will consist of an analysis of the salary scale of women in the government service, the requirements of the positions they fill, and the specific inequalities in the pay they receive.

The complete report will be given to the reclassification commission and is expected to bring about certain reforms which will better the working conditions and salaries of women employees.
