Petition granting permission to build four houses.

Notice of bankruptcy regarding the Alexandria Hotel Co., Inc.

Petition from Company of glass blowers for improvement to street and sidewalk on North Fairfax Street.

Resolution appropriating blank sum to repair walls at city jail.

Resolution from the committee on light regarding the rental of meters.

Petition from sundry property owners for fire plug at the intersection of St. Asaph and Wythe streets.

Communication from the Health Officer regarding amount owing to sundry property owners for sewer taps.

Petition from A. C. Crilly and others to place trash boxes on certain corners in the city.

Communication from H. N. Garner, Corporation Attorney, regarding the increased telephone rates.

COMMON COUNCIL

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the city of Alexandria, Va., held January 15, 1920, there were present H. R. Burke, Esq., President, and Messrs. McCaffrey, Wattles, Desmond, Sullivan, Ticer, Baggett, Ballenger, Lawler, Fletcher and Deavers.

A report of the joint committee on finance and fire recommending that the four operators and the five assistant operators of the fire department be increased \$10 for each man per month.

An amendment by Mr. McCaffrey making the pay \$125 and \$115 per month, was lost, ayes, Mr. McCaffrey 1, noes 8, and the report of the committee was adopted, ayes 9, noes 0.

Upon recommendations of the committee on streets permission were granted Mrs. Rector to repair house at 411 Duke street.

And to the Armour Company to install gasoline tank on Henry street near Cameron street.

And to Belle E. Mudd to make alterations to property on North St. Asaph street and Princess Street between St. Asaph and Pitt streets.

A report of the Health Department from July 1st to December 31, 1919, was received.

A report from H. Noel Garner, Corporation Attorney, on the hearing of the C. & P. Telephone Co., before the State Corporation Commission in Richmond, was received.

A petition from Messrs. Dulquid, Crouch and Crilly for permission to erect street trash boxes in the business section of the city was referred to the committee on streets.


