TANKER SINKS S. S. Mielerio Breaks in Half off the Florida Coast. The tank steamer Mielerio, of Baltimore, broke in half on January 26 and sunk somewhere off the coast of Florida, according to a wireless received by the Navy Department yesterday from the steamship Ozette. Twenty-two persons are reported missing. The wireless said a lifeboat containing 18 members of the Mielerio's crew had been picked up about 125 miles off the Florida coast. The boat of the Mielerio's captain, with 22 persons aboard, is still adrift. There is a heavy northeast wind, but the sea is moderating. The Mielerio was commanded by Capt. A. C. Simmons, of Baltimore who was accompanied on the trip by his wife, 6 year old son, and 4 year old daughter. The boy signed the ship's papers as cabin boy and Mrs. Simmons as stewardess. On its last trip the Mielerio was repaired at Curtis Bay and an unusual experiment made when the forward part of the ship was ballasted to raise her stern. The Mielerio was operated by the Cuba Distilling Company, of New York, and was bound from Matanzas, Cuba, to Philadelphia with a cargo of molasses.

REDS EXECUTED 27 Communists Have Now Paid Penalty For Reign of Terror. Budapest, Jan. 31.—Three Communists were executed Thursday morning, making a total of 27 to date. All were duly tried and it was shown that they were responsible for murders. Two of the three, named Pergovic and Terebo, Red guards, carried out the orders of Bela Kan and shot two Ukrainian officers and robbed them of a large sum of gold. The other two brothers committed suicide. Ladislav had a unique history. A Judge, he kept an express train of three cars waiting constantly at the depot, so that whenever occasion arose he could proceed through Hungary to condemn to death anti-Bolshevists. There were 42 illegal execution against him, though the exact number for which he was responsible never will be known.

MINERS STRIKE Men Object to Waiting Around a Hour for Envelopes. Shenandoah, Pa., Jan. 31.—The most unusual strike in the history of the region was inaugurated at Buck Mountain colliery Thursday when the several hundred employees refused to accept their pay. There was no complaint against wages or hours of labor, but the men insist on receiving their semi-monthly pay as soon as their day's work is over. Under the present system of the Lehigh Valley Coal Company a employees are obliged to wait until 3:30 o'clock on pay day before the distribution of wages commences. Miners and others who quit an hour or two earlier in the day are compelled to wait around until that hour. The paymasters returned to Wilkes Barre with most of the money. The colliery is idle.

TOOK \$50,000 FROM CITY Gave Money to Woman, Ohio Mar Says: Fined \$100,640.10. Warren, Ohio, Jan. 31.—Charles E. Kistler, former city treasurer, yesterday pleaded guilty to a charge of embezzling city funds and was fined \$100,640.10, double the amount of money embezzled, and sentenced to from one to twenty years in the State penitentiary by Common Pleas Judge C. W. Wilkins. Since the shortage in Kistler's accounts was discovered early this month he has maintained that he gave the bulk of the money to Mrs. Lillian Jane Wilson, of Cleveland. A warrant for the arrest of Mrs. Wilson has been issued and she is being sought by the police.

GIRL SLAYER EXONERATED Jury Finds Ruth Jefferson Killed—Father in Defense of Mother. Annapolis, Md., Jan. 31.—A coroner's jury Thursday exonerated Ruth Jefferson, the pretty 18 year old telephone operator who shot and killed her father, Charles Jefferson, at their home near Annapolis on January 21, the jury finding that the shooting was done in defense of herself and mother.
