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RULES OF THE ROAD

Captain C. B. Samuels, of the Richmond traffic department, has announced additional rules for drivers which are substantially embraced in the new traffic law of the city of Alexandria.

Among other things he says: "Every driver of a motor or other vehicle approaching an intersection shall grant the right of way at the intersection to the vehicle approaching from the right, providing that such vehicles are arriving at the point of intersection at approximately the same instant."

"Brakes, according to law, are in first-class condition when going at ten miles an hour, should stop within nine and one-half feet. Fifteen miles an hour, they should stop within twenty feet eight inches, and at a speed of twenty miles an hour, a car should be stopped within thirty-seven feet."

Captain Samuels has laid down some safety commandments.

"When passing children, drive slowly, as they generally do the unexpected thing. In their play they are liable to dash suddenly in front of an automobile and the only way you can save them is to have your car under full control."

"Be considerate toward others using the street."

"Do not slow passing other vehicles, going around corners and approaching crosswalks."

"Stop behind cars taking on or discharging passengers."

"Look ahead, and keep on the lookout for intersecting traffic."

"Better be careful than sorry."

Captain Samuels has enumerated the following as a safety code for all drivers, which will, if followed, minimize the number of accidents.

"Don't run fast into or across a main highway."

"Don't take blind curves too fast; the law is eight miles an hour."

"Don't pass street cars when passengers are boarding or leaving."

"Don't forget that a car or a person may be just around the corner."

"Don't forget that the other driver may be reckless or drunk."

"Don't fail to look out for pedestrians."

"Don't forget that children dash out suddenly and unexpectedly."

"Don't take chances."

"Don't drive into an uncertainty."

"Don't use a headlight with a glare or a dazzle."

"Don't allow bicycle riders to hang on your car."

"Don't cut in short after passing a car."

"Don't hog the road."

"Don't drive down a street five or six miles an hour looking for some one trying to see everybody on the

sidewalk and, at the same time, blocking traffic. This is reckless driving because you can't look at the people on the sidewalk and watch your driving."

FIFTY THOUSAND ARRESTS

More than 50,000 arrests were made in the first six months of constitutional prohibition just closed, Prohibition Commissioner Kramer's annual report will show.

Large percentage of arrests were made by local police and officials who are cooperating with Kramer, but are not directly responsible to him. The number of these arrests can only be estimated since reports are received only from federal agents by Kramer.

Total of 50,000 arrests would indicate that on an average of one in every 2,000 persons in the United States was charged with violating of the prohibition laws between January 16, when the Volstead laws became effective, and June 30, the close of the government's fiscal year.

This average, however, gives but an inadequate idea, federal officials say, of the actual number of violations of the law, since presumably a large number of violators were not detected.

The fifty thousand violators of the prohibition law referred to above represent but a small percentage of the persons believed to be engaged in bootlegging and manufacturing so-called whisky. At the July term of the Corporation Court of Alexandria several persons were indicted by the grand jury for having unlawful quantities of liquor in their possession, while others upon whose premises certain utensils and liquids which are believed to be used in distillation were found were also made to face the jury.

A negro was in the Police Court last night on a charge of using threatening language toward a negro. He was dismissed on that charge, when a second was preferred by the police who produced certain liquids found in his house which it is believed enter into the formula of intoxicants. As the grand jury could not have returned a true bill in his case, he was dismissed.

THE MILLS OF THE GODS

Few tears will be shed, even in Germany, over the tragic end of Prince Joachim, the youngest son of the deposed German Emperor. He was not the kind of princeling who becomes a popular idol either in prosperity or misfortune, though during the war a patriotic effort was made to invest him with heroic glory. A moral weakling, he was not fit to live a man's life, and debauchery and despair opened what seemed to him the only avenue of escape—the back door of self-destruction.

In spite of the pitiful character of this wretched offspring of disastrous royalty, there is a tragedy back of his act which was not of his making. It is the old inexorable law of the sins of the fathers. In this case, as in many others, the sins come back to the children, like a boomerang, and smite the guilty progenitor too. No need, it would seem, for the Allies to devise punishment for the former Emperor. Fate or Providence has taken charge of that. For the unhappy father, innocent of all responsibility for the dreadful things which have come upon her, there can be nothing but compassion, and the hope that she may not be "stretched much longer upon the rack" of this rude world.—Baltimore Sun.

Midkiff an adopted son of Madame Schumann-Heink, and son of a minister at Decatur, Ill., were instantly killed in an airplane fall near here yesterday. Newsom, pilot of the machine, was maneuvering for a landing, when one of the wings suddenly dropped off and the plane fell about 3,500 feet.

Oklahoma City, Okla., July 19.—Lieutenant Rollo Browne and his mechanic, Sergeant George Burleson, both from Post Field, Fort Sill, Okla., were burned to death here yesterday when a plane piloted by Browne fell about seventy-five feet and burst into flames immediately after taking off from the Chamber of Commerce field.
