PENNSY MEN REFUSE CUT

Pittsburgh, April 1.—The first of a series of wage conferences between executives of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and representatives of employees ended late yesterday, when the delegates, named to present the case of the 35,000 maintenance of way and structures and unskilled forces, refused to accept a wage reduction, ranging from 16 to 25 per cent.

The committee of general managers of the road, in charge of the conference, suggested that the workers in question accept the cut. Representatives of the men held a separate meeting late in the afternoon, and they decided, on behalf of the employees, to reject the proposed reduction. This refusal automatically threw the case into the hands of the United States Railroad Labor Board.

The conference yesterday was the initial meeting between representatives of the company and its employees. On Saturday the managers will meet with representatives of signal men.

BODIES OF 200 YANKS FOUND

Paris, April 1.—Nearly 200 bodies of American soldiers have been discovered, more than two years after the armistice, hidden in recesses of the Argonne forest.

The American graves registration office has been able to identify 130 of the bodies, but the remainder are too decayed or mutilated that identification is likely to prove an impossibility.

Virginia Students Parade
Victory Cup Before Rivals

Bristol, Tenn., April 1.—Intensive rivalry over the outcome of a basketball game played here last night reached its climax yesterday when more than 200 students of the Bristol Virginia High School walked out of the High School Building during school hours and marched across the tSate line to the Bristol Tenn., High School, where a demonstration was held.

The Virginia students tried to enter the Tennessee building, but the doors and windows were locked and police on both sides of the city were called out to quell the demonstration.

In the basketball game Tuesday night the Bristol (Virginia) school team defeated Bristol, Tennessee, by a score of 21 to 18, thus winning a silver cup offered for the city championship in a three game series.

After leaving their building yesterday in a body, the Virginia students marched downtown, where they got the cup and then, cheering and singing, "snake danced" to the Tennessee building. Members of the Tennessee faculty restrained their charges with difficulty when the rivals appeared on the campus. After the demonstration most of the Virginia students returned to their school.

VIVIANI PAYS RESPECTS TO PRESIDENT HARDING

Washington, April 1.—Rene Viviani, former Premier of France, was received by President Harding at the White House late yesterday after he had formally presented his credentials as an envoy extraordinary to this country to Secretary Hughes at the State Department.

At both the White House and State Department visits, M. Viviani was accompanied by Ambassador Jusserand and, according to statements by officials at their conclusion, the former Premier's visit remains nothing more than "one of courtesy." It was intimated by those attached to his mission, however, that as an envoy from France he would give an attentive ear to any suggestion involving the relations of France with the United States.
