London Times Predicts U. S. Will Ratify Peace Treaty

London, June 15.—In an editorial bearing the caption "America and Peace," the London Times expresses great satisfaction at two announcements from its Washington correspondents that the Treaty of Versailles would be probably ratified by the United States "at no distant date," though subject to far reaching reservations, and that one of the aims of American foreign policy promises world wide cooperation with Great Britain.

Prison Bars Quickly Change Woman's Mind

Doylestown, Pa., June 15.—When she was on the outside looking in Mary G. Leatherman said she didn't care whether she went to jail for contempt of court or not, but when she was on the inside looking out she changed her mind in exactly twenty-four hours. Miss Leatherman is 60 and lives at Dublin, near here.

She was cited for failure to make distribution as executrix of the \$14,000 estate of William D. Rowland, for whom she was housekeeper many years. She defied the court order on the ground she deserved the entire estate because she never had received any pay and finally was sent to jail after repeated warnings. Now Miss Leatherman, who is worth \$20,000 herself, says she will pay up.

GIRL'S HAIR BURNED RESCUING MOTHER

Harrisburg, June 15.—While helping carry her bedfast mother to safety, Ruth Kramer lost nearly all her hair, during the course of a fire which caused a loss of nearly \$75,000 early this morning. The sick woman was later taken to a place of safety. The fire, which started in a garage, spread to a nearby store and seven residences, during which three people were injured. Narrow escapes were numerous, as flames spread with such rapidity that escape by stairways in several instances was cut off before sleeping persons were awakened.

Prince street between Royal and Henry streets; \$9,000 for macadam roadway on Duke street between Royal and Patrick streets, and \$16,000 for macadam roadway on Washington street between Duke and Franklin streets.

Councilman Devers offered a resolution that all trains over the Washington-Virginia Railway line come to a full stop at Cameron and West streets and at King and West streets letting off all passengers. This was referred to the committee on streets.

A resolution of Councilman Desmond that the auditor draw his warrant for \$25 for each of the Relief Hook and Ladder Company and for Motor Company No. 5, was adopted. It was explained that this money is the salary for Mr. Desmond who acted as chief of the fire department during the month of May and he desires to present it to the two companies.

Petition for sewer on West street between Prince and Duke streets was referred to committee on streets and finance. Permission granted for erection of kitchen at 320 South Alfred street; resolution appropriating \$250 for pipe sewer on Peyton street north of Princess street was referred to the committee on streets and finance.
