

DR. ALDERMAN DEFENDS BOARD OF VISITORS FOR THEIR CHANGE OF VIEWS

Charlottesville, Va., July 7.—Declaring that "the medical man who proudly holds in 1921 the same theory of the origin of yellow fever that he held in 1900, is consistent but dangerous." Dr. Edwin A. Alderman, president of the University of Virginia, scores the recent publicity given by the committee for the adoption of the report of the medical commission to the fact that in 1912 the Board of Visitors of the University favored Richmond as a site for the medical school.

"The rector and visitors of the University of Virginia in 1912 were acting in the light of facts and conditions then facing them and on the then generally believed hypothesis that clinical material was not available save in large cities," stated Dr. Alderman in his address before the recent meeting of the board of visitors of the University when that body overwhelmingly favored the retention of the medical school at Charlottesville.

"These eight years have seen the largest forward movement in medical education in generations. The facts and conditions have utterly changed. The value of direct University connection has become paramount. Our own University Hospital has grown into power; small cities have developed satisfactory clinics; and the point of view of those who really study medical problems has culminated in the impressive example of Vanderbilt University of Virginia are now acting in the light of present conditions and knowledge. To follow any other course would be for them to substitute stubborn consistency for intelligent responsibility, and this is a fatal procedure in a world of growth. BUILDS 108,962 IN JUNE

Demand Exceeds Output as Ford Breaks All Previous Records During the month of June, the Ford Motor Company, through its Detroit factories and 22 assembly plants throughout the country reached the production of 108,962 Ford cars and trucks, setting up a new high record for one month. Production of Ford cars and trucks has been steadily increasing since early spring, and shows substantial gains over the same period last year. The second quarter of 1921, viz., April, May and June, shows an output of 301,796 Ford cars and trucks against 220,878 for the same three months of last year, or a net increase of 80,918.

Despite the fact, however, that the Ford plants have been running at maximum capacity, the demand for Ford cars and trucks is not being met, and at the present time, many thousands unfilled orders have been piled up ahead so that Ford sales are still limited by manufacturing facilities rather than marketing possibilities. Particularly is this true with respect to enclosed cars, for which the demand has been unusually heavy.

One reason cited by Ford officials for the unprecedented demand for Ford cars is the present tendency toward economy. Many of those whose names have been added to the long list of buyers might well have afforded larger and more costly cars than the Ford, but it is the belief that most prospective motor car buyers are investigating all of the costs incident to motoring much more carefully than at any period during the past five years.

The estimated output of the Ford factories for July calls for 109,000 cars and trucks, or a production of 4360 a day for 25 days. Since the assembling of cars is being handled during an eight hour work day only, the hourly output will be 545 cars.
