VIRGINIA NEWS

Winchester—Bootleggers in Shenandoah Valley are reported to have formed an agreement with those east of the Blue Ridge to appeal all cases decided against them by county magistrates, in whose courts, it is said, the fees, and cost usually are greatly in excess of the fines. It is the intention of the blockade runners to carry their cases to the Circuit Court and have trial by jury. They say the magistrates and constables are imposing upon their good nature in assessing exorbitant fines, costs and fees. The bootleggers say they are engaged in an industry which is supplying a "long felt want," and that they should not be so treated in the lower courts.

Norfolk—Steps toward the formation of a federation of Republican women's clubs in Virginia today were taken when Mrs. Harriet Taylor Upton, of Ohio, vice chairman of the Republican national committee, and leader of Republican women of this country, and Miss Edna Annette Beveridge, special representative of the Republican national committee, met the Republican women of Norfolk.

Charlottesville—Historic "Birdwood" just west of the University of Virginia and one of the most desirable farms anywhere in Piedmont, Va. has been sold to Hollis Rinchart to Henry L. Fonda, of Pennsylvania. The price realized is said to have been between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

Richmond—For the first time in the history of Richmond, women served as honorary pallbearers at the funeral Friday of Mrs. Lila Meade Valentine, organizer and first president of the Equal Suffrage League of Virginia.

IRISH SITUATION SHAPING BETTER

(Continued from page one)

ter had shifted to the Ulstermen's camp. It is intimated in a well-informed quarter that Sir James now is face to face with the definite alternatives arrived at in the Lloyd George De Valera interchanges of yesterday and today. The same informant expressed belief that these are not regarded as utterly impossible by Sir James, but that they involve concessions which the Ulster leader is unwilling to pledge on his own responsibility.

At the headquarters of Mr. de Valera there was perceptible a lessening of the tension tonight. Here a statement was given to the Associated Press by one in a position to get an authoritative view of the situation as seen by the Irish delegate. It reads: "The present discussions are designed to find, if possible, suitable ground for holding a useful conference—one that might legitimately be termed a peace conference."

"So far as the De Valera's representatives are concerned, what Sir James Craig says to Premier Lloyd George is of no moment. Mr. De Valera invited representatives of the Irish minorities to confer with him in Dublin. Sir James failed to appear, although he previously had talked with the President. The Southern Unionists did appear and expressed their views.

"Mr. de Valera considers the party of Sir James Craig this was represented at, because the Southern Nationalists consider the Southern and Northern Unionists of the same clan and the same policy.

"By his failure to appear, Mr. de Valera considers Sir James forfeited whatever right he might have claimed to being an element in the situation as between England and Ireland; in other words, it is with Mr. de Valera he ultimately will have to deal. Only in Irish internal politics does Sir James, in Mr. de Valera's mind, continue to be a factor."
