HUGO STINNES EXTENDS GRASP OVER EUROPEAN INDUSTRIES.

Berlin, July 19.—Seeking new markets and new spheres of influence, Hugo Stinnes, Germany's industrial dictator, has bought two

more newspapers. These are in Czechoslovakia, and by their purchase he also gets a controlling influence in the famous Witkowitz Iron and Steel Works. Herr Stinnes and a group of his fellow-magnates are gradually welding the coal, iron, steel, chemical, shipping, transportation, banking and paper industries, as well as the newspapers they can get hold of, into one vast economic machine. Their purpose is to recapture the world's trade, and to make Germany economically more powerful than ever.

According to recent announcements Hugo Stinnes now controls 1,340 companies, the capital of which exceeds 6,000,000,000 paper marks. A million and a half workmen are directly or indirectly employed by him and there is scarcely a single article in every-day use which is not, partly or wholly, produced by one of Stinnes' factories. Since the armistice he has built up a commercial octopus far greater and mightier than any military monster of which either Von Hindenburg or Ludendorff ever dreamed.

Between them these control nearly all that Stinnes has left of industrial Germany. With her army and navy practically gone, Germany's entire population is available for production.

Germany has gone back to her pre-war basis, with her low rate of exchange as her strongest asset in regaining the world's markets.
