

**PROCLAMATION.**

WHEREAS, the Hon. JOSEPH B. ANTHONY, President of the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery, Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace, and Court of Common Pleas, and Orphans Court, in the Eight Judicial District, composed of the counties Northumberland, Columbia and Lycoming; and the Hon. SAMUEL OAKES and STEPHEN BALDY, Esqs., Associate Judges in Columbia county, have issued their precept, bearing date the 23d day of Jan., in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, and to me directed for holding a Court of Oyer and Terminer, and General Jail Delivery, General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, Common Pleas and Orphans' Court in Bloomsburg in the county of Columbia, on the third Monday (being the 16th day of APRIL next, and to continue two weeks:

**History of the Horse.**

Arabia is generally claimed as the original native locality of the horse, and the animal of that country has been regarded as a model of perfection of the species. Strabo, who wrote more than 1,800 years ago, asserts, that the horse did not then flourish in Arabia, and it is asserted by those who have examined the subject, that he did not attain to any considerable degree of superiority there till several centuries after the above period. It is certain that, since the time of Mahomet, great attention has been paid there to the breeding of the horse, and to the cultivation of the qualities of docility, fleetness and endurance. But, whatever may be said of the Arabian stock, it is no better than that of the best English and American. When the two races have actually come in contact on a fete, the English has succeeded over the Arabian. A treatise on this subject says, that in 1825, two English horses ran against two of the fleetest Cossacks which could be found, and in a continued race of 47 miles the English beat. Many mixtures of the two races have been very celebrated, and perhaps from a combination of the blood of both, the highest excellence has been attained. England has been celebrated for her fine horses. It is a matter of record that when Julius Caesar first invaded Britain he took many of the horses found there to Rome, where they immediately became great favorites, although he had previously plundered every region of some of their best breeds. But, there is reason to suppose, that the stock was afterwards greatly improved by a mixture of the Arabian, introduced from Spain, and the Norman and Saxon blood. It is asserted by judicious authorities, that in England, the horse attained his highest point of excellence near the middle of the last century since which time they contend there has been no improvement, though much inequality exists. It is believed, that no horse surpasses our best European bloods, and none equal our fastest trotters; and for draught, for road service, and for the saddle, good judges assert, that the horses, particularly of the Middle and Eastern States, are fully equal in excellence to the same number of those of any other country.

**The Law of Health.**

In the regimen that prize fighters submit themselves to, we may see the secret of acquiring the greatest strength and power of endurance. It is to be strictly temperate in all things; to avoid all debilitating stimulants, such as alcoholic drinks, tea and coffee, tobacco, &c., to rise early, take abundance of exercise in the open air, bath often and observe the most rigid system of cleanliness and abstain from all licentious practices—those noted for pedestrian feats submit themselves to the same kind of regimen. If it may be done from such ignoble motives, how much easier should it be to practice the same system for the greatest of all blessings, health.

**Evergreen Trees for Ornaments.**

Those of our readers who intend ornamenting their grounds with beautiful productions of our native forest, will do well to bear in mind the fact, that evergreens should be transplanted in the spring—deciduous varieties in the fall. The fir rarely succeeds when set at the latter season. It is a beautiful tree, and with proper management removing and transplanting, it is rarely known to fail. In the spring, as soon as the frost begins to relax, or after it is wholly out, but while the nights are sufficiently cold to harden the surface of the soil, cut around the trunk with an axe, or other suitable instrument, severing the lateral roots at the distance of eighteen inches or two feet from the body,—then with as much care as possible, raise the tree from its bed, with all the dirt that will adhere to the roots, and place it in a cart or other vehicle, to be conveyed to the place where it is to be set. The hole for its reception should be sufficiently spacious to receive it without doubling up or otherwise cramping the roots, and be "filled in" with soil as nearly approximating that wherein it grew, as practicable. No heaping up, or "mounding" about the trunk, should be allowed. It is better to concave than a convex surface. No fermentable manure should be applied. Old compost is the best stimulant.
