Includes HASTY LEGISLATION, It appears that a section has been passed by the Legislature at Harrisburg, attached to some private bill, to revive the charter of a company to make a railroad from Harrisburg to Reading, which got through the House, the Harrisburg Telegraph says, without the knowledge of the members from the city & county, who appear to be interested to defeat its passage. Dr. Barden's attention was called away from his reading when it came to the House as a Senate amendment, and some of the other city and county members seemed to notice it. To rectify the mistake, a resolution was offered to call upon the Governor to return it; but this motion was negatived by a large majority, 43 37. The Governor will now have to oppose or sign it, as he finds most proper. He vetoed the North Lebanon Railroad bill, passed under like circumstances, and with a similarly smuggled section.
