RE-NOMINATED.—The Republicans of the Fourth Congressional District of Massachusetts have unanimously re-nominated the Hon. Samuel Hooper as a candidate for re-election to Congress for a fifth term.

Re-Union of Vermont Officers.

The Fifth Annual Re-Union of Vermont officers will be held at Montpelier on Thursday, the 22d of October next. The members of the Re-Union Society, and all Vermont officers of the army and navy are respectfully invited to attend. The usual preliminary meeting for the election of officers and other business will be held at the Court House, at 10 o'clock, a. m. The oration will be delivered by Gen. P. T. Washburn, at the Hall of the Representatives, during the evening.

In issuing this call, it has been thought proper to state briefly the history of the organization, its aims and its objects. In the Autumn of 1864, a few officers and ex-officers issued a call for a meeting to be held at Montpelier, for the purpose of tendering a complimentary dinner to Gen. George J. Stannard, then barely recovered from the effect of his wounds received at the storming of Fort Harrison. About 75 officers assembled in response to that call, and formed a permanent organization. Since that time, meetings of the Society have annually been held, and the membership has increased to about 300, a large majority of whom have been present at the meetings.

The object of this association is simply to afford an opportunity to renew, through social intercourse, the ties of friendship formed in the field; to draw a renewed inspiration and renewed courage for the work yet before us from the "touch of a comrade's elbow," and the sight of the shot-rent standards under which we fought, and so many of our heroes fell; and to keep green and sacred in our hearts the memories of the five thousand who gave their lives for the cause.
