

STATE TREASURER'S OFFICE, MONTPELIER, Vr., January 1, 1869. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN. That under the provisions of an Act of the Legislature, approved Nov. 19th, 1868, no interest will be allowed, after January 1, A. D. 1870, on money in the Treasury of the State to the credit of Officers, Soldiers, or their assignces, which was received under the allotment system of the United States; and the provisions of the Act of the Legislature of this State, approved Nov. 20, 1861.

There is a large number of unsettled allotment accounts on the books of this office, showing balances due to officers and Soldiers or their representatives; as d it is requested that parties entitled to the same, draw the amount their due,

representatives; and it is requested that parties entitled to the same, draw the amount their due, in order that the accounts may be closed at the earliest day practicable.

The Act of Nov. 22, 1861, provides, in case of the decesse of such soldier while in the service, the money due such soldier shall not be deemed assets of such soldier for the payment of debts against such soldier, but shall go to and be held by the widow of such soldier, or next of kin.

To enable those who may have claims upon

To enable those who may have claims upon the State for the balances above referred to, to obtain the same with the least delay, the fol-lowing information is furnished.

ORDER of PAYMENT. First-Upon the order of the person, duly treesed, whose name is on the books of this

office.

SECOND—If such person has deceased, and was married, payment will be made, 1st, to the widow; 2d, if there be no widow, to his child or children (if minors, to the Guardian).

THERD—If he died unmarried, 1st, to his father; 2d, if the father is dead, to the mother; 3d, if both parents are dead, so the brothers and

isters collectively; lastly, to the heirs gene-Application and Proof required, in

case the Soldier has deceased.
