Virginia News.

Jasper Buckland, an aged citizen of Tazewell county, was killed Thursday on the railroad track near his home by a freight locomotive.

George Williams, colored, who murdered his wife at Bluefield, was captured last week by Simon Howard, colored, while trying to make his way to Tennessee.

There are 157 students on the roll of the Washington and Lee University, Lexington, an increase of 18 over the session of last year.

Mr. Willie McVeigh, of Alexandria, one of the parties interested in the legal sale of the Whitmer Building there to Baltimore parties for \$10,000, has taken steps to prevent the confirmation of the sale on the ground of insufficient price.

Judge R. E. Waller, of the Spottsylvania County Court, has appointed Mr. Lee J. Graves, Commonwealth's Attorney for the county, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. A. B. Rawlings.

Miss Jennie McCarthy, of Winchester, was found dead in bed recently at the house of her brother-in-law, Mr. Jacob Riley, in Woodstock. She had been ailing for some time, but was not considered dangerously ill.

The department of education last week decided that the school of methods to be held at Roanoke, the summer school at Pulaski and another at Fredericksburg, a summer school for colored at Hampton and another at Petersburg.

Coal has been discovered near Newport, Page county, it is said, in large quantities. The discovery was made by Mr. James Housden, at the foot of a small mountain on the edge of a stream of water, and all of the indications are for an abundance of coal. A large force of men are now at work tracing the vein.

The members of Grove Avenue Baptist Church, Richmond, who recently withdrew from that church and organized another, met at Monroe Hall last week and extended a call to Rev. J. C. Hiden, D. D., to become its pastor. Dr. Hiden was formerly pastor of Grove Ave. church.

J. D. Barger, a young farmer and postmaster at Barge, six miles from Lexington, has disappeared. He recently sold farm products to the amount of about \$1,500, which amount he is supposed to have carried with him. Barger has a wife and four children. A young lady living in the neighborhood has also disappeared.

LANDRETH'S "New Crop" Garden Seeds at W. Richardson's.

Wheat was quiet on Monday, with No. 2 red commanding 75 cents a bushel in Baltimore. The anticipated government crop report caused the market to be inactive. That report was issued in the evening and represented wheat conditions at 77.5, as against 76.1 same time last year, or a winter wheat crop of about 375,000,000 bushels, without counting the spring wheat crop. - The visible supply, 30,431,000 bushels, shows an increase of 444,000 bushels. Corn is quoted at 38a39 cts. per bushel. Hogs are unchanged in price.

Trees that bear stone fruits usually bloom in this section from the 10th to the 15th of April, but such of them as give signs that they will wear their beautiful spring costume will be later this year in putting it on. The peach and apricot trees do not look as if they will bear any bloom, but the cherry trees show many swelling buds. If the latter are late in opening we may anticipate with more assurance a fruit crop.

Charlestown Advocate: The growing crop of wheat in this county is looking fairly well. The exceeding wet fall was somewhat against the growth and rooting of the plants, and hence the crop is not looking as well as usual for the time of year. We have observed that where the snow was blown off exposing the ground to the low temperatures prevailing in the February blizzard the wheat seems to be entirely killed.

In the case of James H. Castleman, tried before the county court of Frederick at Winchester last week, charged with committing a criminal assault upon his twelve-year-old step-daughter, Laura Virginia Castleman, the jury brought in a verdict of guilty and fixed his punishment at ten years in the penitentiary. The victim of Castleman's assault was supported in her testimony by that of the convicted man's wife.

Mr. M. Botts Lewis, revenue collector, says the law requires a fifty-cent stamp on all bonds under seal, without regard to the amount of the bond. This is highly important, as our people have not so construed the law in transactions where such obligations have been taken. He says, also, that failure to affix the stamp is, of course, not only a violation of the law, but invalidates the bonds.
