Automobilists Pass Slowly

The contestants in the Atlanta Journal-New York Herald tour from Atlanta to New York, passed through Berryville last Friday, running very slowly while in the corporate limits, under warning from Chief Ricamore and his assistants.

Out on the Charles Town road they "hit the high speed" pretty lively.

The steady downpour of rain for the preceding week had made the roads between Roanoke and Staunton almost impassable, so the contestants said, and many broken tires and sprained limbs resulted from overturned cars on the muddy roads.

Quite a number of the machines passed through on Friday night and Saturday, but they no longer designated themselves as "contestants," having been so far delayed that it was impossible to finish on time.

Many of the contestants "cussed" Berryville to a fare-ye-well, on account of the speed limit imposed; but that was to be expected, and nobody got mad. The speed limit prevented anyone from being killed in our streets, at any rate.

We note a complaint in the Roanoke Times to the effect that one of the "speeders" "shaved" the wheels and body of a carriage containing a gentleman and his family, but did not stop up for a moment or give the gentleman a chance to look at his number.

The Berryville officials deserve praise for their action in regard to the big tour of last Friday, and we hope to see the law enforced as regards the single "speeder," no matter who he may be, in the future.

Many citizens will support our statement that in the past very little attention has been paid to a speed limit around this town, but also agree with us that something should be done to put a stop to the nuisance.

Everyone knows that if any citizen of the Town or County should drive along our streets in a buggy, or ride a saddle horse, at half the speed which has been maintained by automobilists, the driver or rider would land in the County Jail—where he belongs.

If a speed limit is good for horses and buggies, it is good for automobiles.

Death of Mr. George H. Byrd.

Mr. George Harrison Byrd, formerly of Winchester, but who has resided for many years in New York, died at his home in that city, 69 Park avenue, last Friday, in the 84th year of his age.

Mr. Byrd was a son of the late Richard Evelyn Byrd, and was born in Winchester. He spent his early days there, and while still in the prime of his life he located in New York city, where he engaged in business. He was successful, and accumulated a comfortable fortune. Mr. Byrd visited this section occasionally during the last ten years, and had many friends here. He retired from business a number of years ago, since which time he led a quiet life at his home in New York.

Mr. Byrd leaves his widow, Mrs. Lucy Byrd; three sons, Messrs. Wickham, Otway and William Byrd, and two daughters, Miss Annie Byrd and Mrs. Lucy Elliott. He was an uncle of Speaker Richard Evelyn Byrd, of the Virginia House of Delegates, and had many other family connections all over Virginia.

The remains were brought to Berryville yesterday (Tuesday) morning at 9 o'clock, and were taken from the train to the Old Chapel, where the full Episcopal burial services were held by Rev. J. M. Robeson, rector of Christ Church at Millwood, after which interment was made in the Old Chapel Cemetery.

The pallbearers were Messrs. R. Powell Page, Geo. H. Burwell, Burwell McGuire, H. F. Byrd, R. P. Whiting, F. B. Whiting and W. T. Lewis.

Former Postmaster Pleads Guilty.

In the United States Court at Harrisonburg last week Thomas J. Sillman, former postmaster at Stone Bridge, was fined \$90.91 and costs for stealing stamps from his office. Sillman pleaded guilty. Testimony was introduced to show that the accused sold stamps to the amount of \$90.91 and used the money obtained thereby to purchase merchandise, whiskey and other saleable articles for his personal use.

Witnesses in the case were Henry Matthews, William S. Green, Thomas Sowers, George W. Lee, and W. L. Fultz. Sillman was removed from office soon after the charges were brought against him last December.

Virginia Peddler's License Upheld.

The validity of the peddler's license law, passed by the Virginia general Assembly several years ago, has been upheld by the Supreme Court of Appeals in a case which went up from the circuit court of Frederick county recently. J. C. Beattie, of Stephens City, was the agent of a Philadelphia wholesale house concern which made a business of selling flavoring extracts, spices and patent medicine throughout the country, and while selling the goods direct to the customers he was detected.

Information was supplied to Magistrate S. M. Stickleby at Stephens City by commissioner of the Revenue H. H. Shull, of the southern district of Frederick county, and a warrant for the arrest of Mr. Beattie was issued. He was given a hearing before Magistrate Stickleby and fined \$100 and costs in accordance with the law for selling goods without a license. He noted an appeal to the circuit court, and after hearing the case Judge T. W. Harrison confirmed the judgment of the Magistrate's court.

The company which Mr. Beattie represented carried the case to the supreme court on a writ of error, and that court has just refused the writ, which affirms the judgment of the circuit court.

The peddler's law was made some years ago to protect local merchants who pay a license to transact business, and although there is an occasional violation of the statute such cases have been rare in this section of the state.

The decision of the court defines who is a peddler and the rights of a person to peddle goods.
