Great Progress in Last Year.

Virginia has done more during the last twelve months to fight consumption than during all previous history, according to a statement made public Monday by the State Anti-Tuberculosis Association. The State has given more liberally for tuberculosis work, private individuals have been more generous and the cities have shown more interest in the work than ever before.

In six cities the Association finds tuberculosis work to be well organized. Petersburg has opened a municipal tuberculosis hospital, Richmond is just completing a tuberculosis camp which will be opened during the next few weeks; Roanoke is planning to move its tuberculosis building and to reorganize its work; Charlottesville and Albemarle County have united for the construction of a tuberculosis hospital; Norfolk has an effective Anti-Tuberculosis League and Staunton will soon establish a hospital for the treatment of indigent consumptives. In a number of other cities and towns, local leagues are arousing public sentiment and hope soon to erect tuberculosis hospitals.

The State Association is optimistic at the outlook, and thinks that the work done by the cities will effectually supplement the work of the State at the Catawba Sanatorium, where will be accommodations for 100 consumptives by October 1. The bulletin of the Association concludes with this cheering statement: "If the present rate of progress continues for the next few years, there is every reason to believe that the annual death loss of 5,000, which Virginia is suffering from consumption, will be reduced at least 50 percent."
