THE NOMINEES.

Peace and Harmony in the Convention

The Republican Convention which was held at Adams on the 15th inst., was very fully attended, not only by delegates, but by persons from the various towns in the county, who were not delegates. Perhaps there has never been a convention held in Mower County where so much harmony and good feeling prevailed. There was no charge of or attempt at double delegations, and we believe every town was fully represented. Everything was conducted quietly and done in good order, and the nominations made soon gave entire satisfaction to the Republicans of the County. The Convention succeeded in placing good and competent men as candidates before the people for the various offices to be filled at the coming election.

Mr. J. S. Irgens was nominated by acclamation as candidate for County Treasurer, which is the right man in the right place. Mr. Irgens' popularity is such that he had no competition for that position, and all seem to concede that he was, and is the proper man for the office of County Treasurer. He is a man of fine business ability, of excellent education, and is in every way qualified to fill that position with honor to himself and credit to the county. He will poll the heaviest Republican vote ever given in Mower County for any candidate, and will be triumphantly elected.

Mr. J. F. Atherton received the nomination for Clerk of the District Court, which is a very fortunate selection. He is a man well qualified to perform the duties of that office, is well known as a good business man, and the people may rest assured that the business entrusted to his care will be well and faithfully performed. He will be elected by a very large majority.

M. E. O. Wheeler, the nominee for Court Commissioner, is an able and well known lawyer of Austin, and has filled the position of District Attorney of Mower County with ability and to the satisfaction of the people. He is worthy and well qualified for the office of Court Commissioner, and of course will be elected.

The next nominee on the list is W. O. Teller, of LeRoy, for member of the legislature. The contest for this position was between Messrs. Teller and Baron, both of LeRoy, and though Mr. Teller received a strong vote, showing that he had many friends in the Convention, Mr. Teller carried the majority of the delegates in his favor. Mr. Teller is one of the best selections that could have been made for the position in the county, as he is one of the most energetic, honorable, and straight-forward men that Mower County affords. LeRoy has long been entitled to a nomination and election of a candidate for some of the important offices and we are pleased to note that the nomination for Representative has fallen upon one so well qualified to fill the position. The people may feel satisfied that their interests will be safe in his hands and that when elected he will work for the interest of the whole County and State. That he will do credit to his constituents in the performance of his duties as Representative, no one who knows him doubts for a moment.

H. A. Brown, the second nominee for Representative, is too well known to need much comment. He is one of the early pioneers of Minnesota, having settled at Brownsville over twelve years ago. He has helped to develop the resources of Mower County and is one of its most substantial farmers. He understands and sympathizes and appreciates the position of the farmer and laboring man and will be vigilant and watchful of the interests of his constituents.

The whole ticket is a good one and will be elected by the largest majority of any ever presented to the people of this county. Let every Republican be at the polls on election day and let us see how large a majority can be polled for the nominees.
