REV. F. L. ANDERSON'S FAREWELL.

Next Sunday will be the last of Rev. F. L. Anderson's service with the Baptist church of this city of which he has been pastor for the past four years. He came here from Chicago and has greatly endeared himself to his church and the whole community. He has labored incessantly and the results of his labors are abundant. He takes with him the respect and confidence of all.

Mr. Anderson is a Minnesota product. He was born in Goodhue county, near Red Wing in August, 1865. He graduated from Pillsbury academy in 1892, from University of Minnesota in 1896, from the Divinity school of the University of Chicago in Dec. 1899, and also took a year of post graduate work there. While at the state university he supplied the pulpits at Kenyon, West Concord and Cheney. While at Chicago he was for four years pastor of the church at Maywood. He was married

at Cherry Grove, Goodhue county, Dec. 26, 1896, to Miss Linda Williams, a lady of rare Christian culture and grace. They have two children Paul and Hope.

They will leave for Chicago next week where Mr. Anderson becomes pastor of the Normal Park Baptist church, one of the strong churches of that city. They leave a vacancy in this community which will be hard to fill. Mr. Anderson, besides his local work, has been closely identified with the general work of the Baptist denomination in the whole state and he will be greatly missed in the convention councils. We feel a personal loss at their leaving us.
