CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION

Dakota Land and Title Company.

We, the undersigned, hereby certify that for the purpose of forming a corporation under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 33 of the Revised Laws of Minnesota of 1905, we do associate ourselves together and adopt the following articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation is "DAKOTA LAND AND TITLE COMPANY" and the general nature of its business is to buy, own, hold, sell, lease and otherwise dispose of the same, either for itself or as agent for others; to make and compile abstracts of title to real and personal property, and generally to do any and all things necessary or expedient in carrying out and conducting a general real estate and abstracting business, and the principal place of transacting the same is in Dexter, Minnesota.
