AUSTIN, MINN.

Ordinance No. 16, Village of Brownsdale.

An ordinance to prohibit within the limits of the village of Brownsdale, Minn., the keeping, within any yard or enclosure, of stock, animals or fowls which by their noise or cries cause annoyance and discomfort to and disturbance of citizens of said village.

The Common Council of the Village of Brownsdale, Minn., do ordain:
Sec. 1. It is hereby declared to be a nuisance and unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep within the corporate limits of the village of Brownsdale, Minn., in any yard, pen or enclosure any cattle, sheep, swine, dogs, or other animals, or any geese, ducks, guinea hens or other fowls, which said animals or fowls by their bellowing, bleating, squealing, howling, barking, cackling or other cries, or noise cause material annoyance, discomfort and disturbance to citizens of said village.

Sec. 2. Any person keeping in any yard, pen or enclosure within the limits of the village of Brownsdale any animals or fowls which by their noise, calls or cries materially annoy and disturb citizens of said village contrary to the provisions of section one of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof before any justice of the peace having jurisdiction be guilty of a misdemeanor and be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$20 and costs of prosecution, or imprisonment in the county jail of Mower county for not less than five nor more than thirty days.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

Passed by a vote of the ayes and nays this 13th day of September, A. D. 1909, Ayes 4, Nays 0. Approved.
