The LaCrosse elevator was nearly empty, containing only some wool and a few bushels of wheat. The loss will probably reach about \$15,000, mostly covered by insurance. The Hunting Elevator Co. will soon commence the erection of a new building in time for the new crop. It is not certain as to rebuilding of the other elevator this year. The fire is thought to have been set by tramps, nine of them having been in the village and some of them driven out of town. From those who first saw the fire there was a blaze at both the corner elevator and in the stock yards. We might also mention that a picture ought to be taken of Henry Bitke's dog, for it was the continual barking of the dog that awoke his master that started the "war whoop". During the progress of the fire sparks lit all over town and a big barn was burned in Geo. Shortt's yard and it would have went up in flames had it not been for the timely application of water.

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
