In Feb. 1862, he was married to Almira Martin and the fall following enlisted in the 14th N. Y. Vol., serving till the end of the war. Soon after coming to LeRoy his wife died, and on July 4th, 1870 he was married to Sarah Hutchins, who died April 27, 1907, to this union one daughter was born, Edna, now Mrs. Wm. H. Armstrong, there are no other relatives except a half-sister and two nephews, who reside in N. Y. During the illness of the mother, Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong gave up their pleasant and comfortable home and came to care for her, and when she was taken away they stayed by her and cared for her, who had ever been a loving and tender father, the daughter in her deep grief, so seriously agitated by the thought of not being near at the last moment.

WOOL BILL TO CONFERENCE

House Refuses to Concur in Senate Amendments.

Washington, Aug. 2.—The house of representatives refused to concur in the amendments made in the senate to the wool bill previously passed in the house.

A conference was asked for and Speaker Clark named the following conferees: Representatives Underwood of Alabama, Randall of Texas and Harrison of New York, Democrats, and Payne of New York and Dalzell of Pennsylvania, Republicans.

The senate conferees, according to present indications, will include Senators Penrose and Cullom, regular Republicans, Bailey and Simmons, Democrats, and La Follette, progressive Republican.
