REUBEN O. HALL.

R. O. Hall, aged 84 years, died at his home on Maple street early Saturday morning, Sept. 27, 1913, of old age. He was about as usual in the morning and ate supper. He retired feeling as well as usual and in the morning he was found in bed sleeping the sleep that knows no waking here. He had passed away very peacefully without a struggle. It is a beautiful way for an aged pilgrim to depart. Reuben Oscar Hall has been closely identified with Austin and its interests for the past forty years. He was born in Rochester, Vt. Jan. 10, 1829. He was the son of Reuben and Marcella (Brown) Hall. His ancestors were among the early settlers of the Green Mountain State. His maternal grandfather was a soldier in the war of 1812 and fought in the battle of Plattsburg. His parents came west to Wisconsin in 1853 and came to Mower county in 1867 and both are buried in Oakwood. Reuben completed his education at the Rutland, Vt. High school and at the age of 21 years turned his back on his native hills and came west. He came first to Waukau, Wis. and farmed summers and taught school winters for six years. In 1856 he went to Mendota, Ill. and was in the grocery business there for ten years, and then purchased a farm near Wheaton, Ill. In 1866, he went to Dixon, Ill. and was in the flour business for four years, coming to Austin in 1873. He opened a dry goods store here with his son-in-law, Chas. L. West, and continued in it for



20 years. He came here in the vigor of mature manhood and gave his energies to the building up of the best interests of this community. Early in life he united with the church on profession and was a trustee of the M. E. church of Austin for nearly forty years. He was for years superintendent of the Sunday school and was ever zealous in the Lord's work here. He contributed to the building of every church edifice now standing in this city. He took great interest in education and was for years a member of the Board of Education. He was for years an officer of the Austin Cemetery association and did much for its development into its present beautiful condition. He was interested in temperance and believed in prohibition as the only sure remedy for our national evil. He never used liquor or tobacco in any form during his long life. He was sheriff of Mower county from 1875 to 1879 and during those troublesome times never swerved from discharge of official duty. He was alderman from the second ward and in many other ways received the confidence of his fellow citizens. He was for years one of the ardent supporters of the Mower County Agricultural society and a life member. He was a man very congenial and friendly. He loved his home and was happy in it. Kind-hearted and benevolent he encouraged and assisted many in need and trouble. He was a Master Mason and a member of St. Bernard Commandry Knights Templar. He was a Republican in politics. Funeral services conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. F. Stout, assisted by Rev. G. H. TenBroeck, were held at the residence yesterday afternoon. The four sons were bearers. Burial in Oakwood cemetery under the auspices of Fidelity lodge, A. F. and A. M. St. Bernard commandry acted as escort. Mr. Hall was twice married. For his first wife he married Miss Frances A. Smith April 8, 1852, at Waukau, Wis. She was a native of New York state. She died July 25, 1896, leaving six children, Mrs. Chas. L. West, now deceased, Mrs. Lila M. Baird of Austin, Frank O. of Austin, Adelbert E., agent of the Wells Fargo express company at Madison, S. D., Fred H. of Oklahoma City, traveling salesman for Marshall Field Co. of Chicago, Dr. Jay M. of St. Paul. For his second wife Mr. Hall married to Miss Alice G. Harvey of Woodstock, Vt. Aug. 31, 1897. To this union two children were born both surviving: Louise Elizabeth born Feb. 18, 1899, and Reuben Harvey, born April 17, 1905. Mrs. Hall survives. There are eleven grandchildren living. Mr. Hall has one brother living, Wallace Hall of Akron, Iowa.

MRS. ALICE GORDON.

Mrs. Alice Gordon, aged 78 years, widow of Henry W. Gordon, died Sept. 21, 1913 at Fergus Falls after a long affliction. Her maiden name was Alice Seeley. She was born in Chautauque county, N. Y. and at an early age came to Otranto. She was married to Henry W. Gordon, a brother of Mrs. Wm. West and they lived for some time in Otranto. Mr. Gordon served in Co. F, 4th Minn. Vols. Soon after the war they moved to Dodge county, east of Blooming Prairie and later to Dodge Centre. Mr. Gordon died and was buried at Woodbury cemetery, Lyle. There was one son, Warren, who died at Dodge Centre and is buried there. The body of Mrs. Gordon was brought here and on Thursday was laid to rest in Woodbury cemetery, burial service by Rev. C. D. Belden of Austin.

GEORGE W. WILLIAMS.

George W. Williams, aged 78 years, died at his home near Fruitland, New Mexico, Sept. 17, 1913, of asthmatic troubles complicated with old age. He was born in New York state and was married there to Miss Emeline Smith. They came to Darien, Wis. and about 1869 they came to Lansing in this county where they lived for many years. About 28 years ago Williams died about 12 years ago. They moved to Louisiana where Mrs. Williams has lived in New Mexico for about three years. He was a devoted member of the Baptist church for many years. He leaves three children: Mrs. Fred State of White, S. D., Geo. W. Williams, Jr. of Hanford, Cal. and Mrs. M. E. Burton of Austin. Many of our readers remember deceased. He was a man of integrity, firm in his convictions and was trusted and respected. He was buried in the cemetery near his home.

MRS. TRUMAN A. EDSON.

Mrs. Truman A. Edson, aged 67 years, died at her home east of Austin, early Sunday morning, Sept. 28, 1913, of cancer of the bowels after a year's illness during which she had sought relief in vain. Angia Brown was born in Worcester, Mass. Sept. 5, 1852. She was married in Austin Jan. 18, 1882 to Mr. Edson and they have since lived in this vicinity except three years spent at Sun Prairie, Wis. She was a devoted member of the M. E. church and also of the Rebekahs. She was a woman of kindly heart, devoted to her home and loved ones and was highly esteemed for her sterling character. She leaves her husband and three children: Mrs. Gail Prestegard, Idaho City, Idaho, Lee at home, and Fred M. in the Austin National bank. Funeral services were held yesterday forenoon at the M. E. church, Rev. J. F. Stout officiating. Interment in Oakwood. Deceased leaves four sisters—Mrs. Charlotte Baird, Austin, Mrs. R. O. Hunt and Miss Alice Brown, Santa Barbara, Cal. and Mrs. Tama Buck, Waupaca, Wis.

MRS. NELS N. HAGNA.

Mrs. Nels N. Hagna, aged 76 years, died at her home in Udolpho Tuesday, Sept. 23, 1913, of cerebral hemorrhage. She was born in Norway, Feb. 11, 1837, and came to this country when 15 years old. She lived two years in Rock county, Wis. and then moved to Elgin, Iowa. In 1861 she was married to Ole Lewis. They moved at once to Udolpho and he was killed as a soldier in the civil war. Oct. 26, 1867, she was married to Nels N. Hagna who survives her, and several children of this marriage. Two children by the first marriage survive also. Deceased was of a kind loving disposition, a faithful wife and mother, and her loss is deeply felt. Funeral was held Friday at the Lutheran church in Blooming Prairie.

MRS. MARGARET ARENS.

Mrs. Margaret Arens, aged 78 years died early Wednesday morning, Sept. 24, 1913, at her home in this city. She had been in failing health for several years. She was born in Germany and was married to Stephen Arens. They came to this country 32 years ago living at Taopi for two years and then coming to Austin. The husband died five years ago. Four sons survive—Matt, Frank, Joe and Adam. Funeral was held at St. Augustine's church Friday morning, Monsgr. E. H. Devlin officiating. Interment in Catholic cemetery.

Good Fertilizer for Ferns.

Nitrate of soda dissolved in water should be given to ferns that are small or weak, but do not make the proportion of nitrate more than one-quarter of an ounce to the gallon, but large plants, and those of vigorous growth should be watered with a solution in proportion of one-half an ounce of nitrate to the gallon. Apply about every ten days. Soot and salt are also good.

RUDE SHOCK FOR SULZER DEFENSE

Witness Says Governor Asked Him to Testify Falsely.

STORY REMAINS UNSHAKEN

Says He Gave \$500 to the Campaign Fund and That the Executive Urged Him to Deny It.

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 27.—Governor William Sulzer tried to persuade contributors to his campaign fund not to testify against him, according to evidence adduced at his impeachment trial.

He asked Duncan W. Peck, state superintendent of public works, who gave \$500 to the fund, to violate his oath on the witness stand, in event he should be called to testify before the Frawley investigating committee, Peck swore.

The governor, Peck asserted, had told him that he, too, would deny having received contributions. This conversation, he said, was held in the governor's office at the capitol. The witness was examined by John B. Stanchfield as to the precise words used by the governor.

"What did he say?"
"He said: 'Do as I shall do, deny it.'"
"What else was said, if anything?"
"I said: 'I suppose I shall be under oath.' He said 'That is nothing; forget it.'"

Remembers Exact Words.

Attorney Hinman, cross-examining for the defense, asked Peck if it were possible that he could have been mistaken about a single word that passed between him and the governor.

"Not a word," Peck replied emphatically.
The governor's attorneys gave indications of being confounded by the testimony of Peck and Henry W. Morgenthau. None of them had the faintest inkling, it was learned, that such accusations were to be brought by the attorneys' assembly managers.

It was further brought out that Richard Croker, Jr., son of the former leader of Tammany, had contributed a \$2,000 check, payable at the request of Sulzer to the order of "Cash," and that the check was cashed by Frederick L. Colwell, alleged to have been the governor's agent in his Wall street transactions.

Croker testified that the governor wanted the check in a convenient form to cash it immediately, because he was in a hurry to start on his campaign trip through the state. This was on Oct. 12, but it developed that Colwell did not cash the check until Oct. 31.

MAY NOT BE SAME MAN

Photograph of Johannes Schmidt Does Not Resemble Mainz Priest.

Berlin, Sept. 25.—The police of Frankfurt-on-the-Main have received from New York a photograph of Father Johannes Schmidt, the self-confessed murderer of Anna Amuller, but according to the Tageblatt they found no comparison between the American photograph and one in their possession of the former Mainz priest. They were so unlike that it is doubtful whether the two men are identical.

The difference in the characteristic features of the mouths and around the eyes are so great that if the photographs represent the same person he must have greatly changed since he left Germany.

AWAITING NEW TARIFF BILL

Imports Worth \$150,000,000 Held in Bonded Warehouses.
Washington, Sept. 23.—Imports worth \$150,000,000 are held in bonded warehouses at ports of entry awaiting lower tariff duties effective when the new tariff bill is signed, according to estimates of customs officials. Elaborate preparations have been made to handle this flood of business expected the minute President Wilson signs the new bill. Telegraphic flashes notifying customs collectors of the signature will be sent.

ULSTER PARLIAMENT MEETS

Plans Laid for Formation of Provisional Government.

Belfast, Sept. 25.—The embryo "parliament of Ulster," at present known as the Ulster Unionist council, assembled in Ulster hall in this city to discuss plans for provisional government in the event of the home rule bill becoming law. Six hundred delegates were present. The Marquis of Londonderry, former lord lieutenant of Ireland, was the chairman.

Fugitive Located by Wireless.
Chicago, Sept. 25.—By means of the wireless telegraph the Chicago police have located Nicholas Desmore, wanted here for murder, on board the steamer Capua, which sailed from New York on Sept. 23. Announcement of the success of the long hunt for the man was made here and arrangements have been completed for his arrest when the vessel docks at Gibraltar.

SIR EDWARD CARSON:
Leader in Movement to Raise Big Fund to Fight Home Rule.



The Unionist conference in Belfast, Ireland, agreed to raise a fund of \$5,000,000 to indemnify members of the Ulster volunteers, the militiamen now being drilled. From this fund it is proposed to pay men and their families for property loss, injury and death if fighting occurs in the efforts to prevent home rule for Ireland. Sir Edward Carson, a leader of the movement, aided in framing the articles governing the fund. A statement was issued saying the provisional government had been approved.

TAXPAYER'S SUIT IS PLAN OF THAW

Fugitive Will Seek Legal Removal to Pennsylvania.

Concord, N. H., Sept. 23.—In order to bring about his legal removal to Pennsylvania, in the event that the request of the New York authorities for his extradition is denied by Governor Felker, a taxpayer's suit against the state of New York is planned by Harry K. Thaw.

Thaw said that a report had reached him from New York that William T. Jerome intended to take no further steps in the case here if the executive refused to grant extradition.

Replying to the suggestion that this might necessitate his permanent residence in New Hampshire Thaw said he was confident that a taxpayer's suit to prevent further expense to New York on account of a citizen of another state would bring about his legal removal to his home state.

MAYOR GAYNOR'S WILL.

New York, Sept. 25.—The will of William J. Gaynor, late mayor of New York, as filed, leaves to the widow his Brooklyn residence and 500 shares of Royal Baking Powder stock.

GEORGIA CONGRESSMAN DIES

Representative Roddenberry Succumbs to Nervous Breakdown.
Thomasville, Ga., Sept. 26.—Congressman Seaborn A. Roddenberry, who had been ill at his home here since Sunday, is dead.

FLY 118 MILES AN HOUR

Two French Aviators Set New World's Speed Record.
Rheims, France, Sept. 28.—The remarkable speed of 118.6 miles an hour, breaking the former world's record of 111 1/2 miles an hour, was attained here by both Emile Vedrines and Maurice Prevost, two French aviators.

SLAYER BATTLES WITH SHERIFF

Benton, Ill., Sept. 28.—After a battle with deputy sheriffs, John Hurzan, a miner, was arrested here in connection with the murder of two musicians recently. Hurzan was dangerously wounded in the battle.
