

WALTHAM STATE BANK ROBBERD.

Some time after midnight last Friday morning robbers entered the Waltham state bank in Waltham village, this county, with a skeleton key, broke thru the thirteen inch brick wall of the vault with iron tools stolen from the railroad section house and then blew off the doors of the safe with nitroglycerine, using a second charge for the inner door. They had access to the whole business then and took away \$3,936 in cash and notes and other securities to the face of \$70,000. The robbery was not discovered until about eight o'clock. The sheriff was promptly notified and since then, diligent search has been made for a clue but up to Monday night none was found. The bank is insured in the Bankers Protective association and will lose nothing, but the inconvenience will be considerable. The bank is transacting business as usual. The papers stolen are absolutely of no value to the robbers and it is hoped that they may be found later. This is coming close home.
