The rest rooms have been visited by 4,000 persons during this year.
The Woman's Exchange is growing. Total receipts for the year 1914, an increase of \$400 over last year.

Rooming places have been found for 95, and work secured for many who desired it.
A ten weeks' Bible course in Old Testament study was given by Dr. Stout with an enrollment of twenty.

Vesper services have been held regularly, first and third Sundays of each month. Average attendance about forty.

Teachers' Training class has completed its course, and three have secured diplomas.

STATE ART EXHIBIT.

The tenth annual exhibit of the Minnesota State Art society is being held this week at armory hall and is very attractive. The pictures and other exhibits are not simply the best which Minnesota has produced but there is also a large loan exhibit from various places and artists of the country, treasures valued at \$250,000. Catalogues are furnished for the complete list so that it is easy for a stranger to enjoy and know what the subjects are. Paintings in oil and water colors, pastels, etchings, handicraft of various sorts, china, in fact all lines of art are well represented and they are worthy of study and time. The display of bronzes is noticeable. The drawings of model village and farm homes may be of immense practical value to many.

The exhibit was opened Saturday evening with a program and address by the state director, Maurice I. Flagg. There are programs given daily. Monday was Floral club day, yesterday was Art and Travel club day with a paper on the Mission of Pictures by Mrs. J. H. Skinner, a reading by Mrs. Sorfaten, vocal duet by Mrs. S. M. Clefton and Mrs. Ray Pooler and a piano solo by Mary Tichy. Today is Out of Town day and hundreds from surrounding towns are expected. The attendance thus far has been excellent, up into the thousands including a good percentage of men. A voting contest is on for the most popular picture, ten cents a vote, everybody allowed to vote as often as they please at this price. Mrs. H. A. Avery is chairman of the local committee of arrangements and in co-operation with her various committees the arrangements have been excellent.

Tomorrow will be Stoddard Club and Era Club Day. Friday will be St. Augustine's Reading circle day and Saturday Children's Day. The exhibition will close next Monday. It is free to every one. It ought to be of interest to everyone. Open daily 10-12 a. m., 2-6 p. m. and 7-10 in the evening. It is a rare opportunity for this whole community and for southern Minnesota.

TO SURVEY STATE PARK.

E. V. Willar, acting state drainage engineer, is expected in Austin this week to commence the survey of Horace Austin state park. As soon as his work is completed it will be known what dirt is to be removed and how far it must be taken and what kind of a dredge will be needed here. The local committee is keeping in close touch with the state officials.
