MRS. CHARLES S. PALMER.

Mrs. Charles S. Palmer, age 42 years, died very suddenly of heart failure at her home in LeRoy village, early Friday morning, May 29, 1914. From the independent we gather the following facts of her life. Martha Dodge Jones was born December 1, 1871 at Woodbine, Iowa. Her childhood was spent at Carroll, Iowa with a few years in South Dakota. She came to Le Roy in 1884 and made her home with her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. William Allen. She was married on the 11th day of March 1896 to Charles S. Palmer and they have enjoyed eighteen years of as perfect home life as heart could desire. To them were born a son, Robert, now 16 years, and a daughter, Helen aged 14 years. Besides the children and husband, are left a sister, Mrs. Frank T. Young, and a circle of close relatives and friends into whose hearts she has entered by the strength of her beautiful character and from whom she had won the deepest regard and devotion.

The character of Mrs. Palmer was most exemplary and endearing to those who knew and understood her. Modest, refined, affectionate, tender, sweet and unselfish, she sought not for public favor but in her quiet, unassuming manner secured her pleasures by seeking to bring sunshine and happiness into the lives of her family and her friends. Funeral services were held from the home Tuesday afternoon, the Reverends Williams and Robbins conducting them. The Le Roy Choral Club of which Mrs. Palmer was a member, did the singing.

MRS. AMELIA FULLER.

Mrs. Amelia Fuller, aged 91 years, widow of Ira Fuller, died at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. J. E. Ober Wednesday evening, June 3, 1914 of heart trouble after an illness of about seven weeks. Amelia Hawley was born Jan. 29, 1823 at Gainesville, N. Y. She was married there to Ira Fuller in October, 1842. They lived at Gainesville until 1861 when they came west to Minnesota settling in Oakland township, Freeborn county. They moved to Austin in 1867. There were four children born to them: Mrs. Clarissa A. Hitchcock, Jerome B. Fuller, Joseph and Mrs. Viola E. Miner. The three oldest died in Austin in 1868 within twenty-four hours of typhoid on the same spot. E. Ober home now is located. Viola E. Miner died in Minneapolis May 25, 1893, and the father died in Austin Feb. 13, 1909. They lived in Austin since about twenty years ago and twenty years previous to that were mostly in Minneapolis. There are left three grandchildren, one great grandchild and one great great grandchild. Mrs. Fuller retained her physical and mental powers to a remarkable degree to the end of her life. She was a great reader and was liberal enough to read both sides of a subject. She was broad and kind in her judgments and was a woman much beloved. She was one of the first to help organize the church in Austin. She

has made her home for the past twenty years with her granddaughter, Mrs. Ober. Funeral service, conducted by Rev. C. D. Belden, was held at the home Friday morning. Interment in Oakwood beside her husband.

MRS. WILHELMINE E. KRANTZ.

Mrs. Wilhelmine E. Krantz, aged nearly 75 years, died at the home of her son in Lansing township, six miles northwest of Austin, early Sunday morning, June 7, of the infirmities of old age. She was born in Germany June 27, 1839. Funeral was held at the house yesterday forenoon, Rev. W. F. Milbrath of Austin officiating.
