AWAIT DISPOSITION OF DISTRICT COURT.

We gave an account last week of the shooting of William Henry Dixon by his 15 year old son, Frank at their home several miles east of Brownsdale soon after midnight at the request of the boy's mother. Mrs. Dixon and Frank were brought into justice court here and waived examination and in default of bail were committed to jail to await the action of district court. The Dixons came to this county from Wisconsin about 15 years ago. Mr. Dixon is a drinking man and at times has been very abusive and threatening to his family and Mrs. Dixon has lived in dread of what he might do when intoxicated. She is the mother of ten children, eight of them living. They first lived on a rented farm near Grand Meadow, later on one of the Ben King farms and elsewhere in that locality and for the last year have been on the old John Rettig farm. Dixon will recover from the effects of the shot in his head and we see him on the street with his head bandaged. He now wishes to call off all further legal proceedings and have his wife and son return home to help take care of the house and crops.

STATE FIREMEN'S CONVENTION.

The State Firemen's convention meets at Fairmont this week Wednesday and Thursday, 17 and 18.
