MRS. JOHN HAYES.
Mrs. John Hayes of Oakland died at the home of her parents Mr. and Mrs. Christ Nelson June 22, 1914. Selma Nelson was born in Wisconsin July 1, 1892 and was baptized at the Lutheran church in Homer by Rev. O. Naess of Boscobel Wis. In 1893 the family moved to Lansing where they lived until 1911 when they bought a farm near Oakland. She was married to John Hayes in November 1911 and one daughter, Irene was born to them. Husband and daughter are left to mourn, also four sisters and four brothers. The sisters are Alma, a twin of deceased, Dora, Marie and Nina. The brothers are Elvin, Clarence, Julius and Charles. Funeral services were held at Red Oak Grove church conducted by Rev. J. A. E. Naess of Austin.

IVER HENDRICKSON.
Iver Hendrickson, aged 68 years, died at his home in LeRoy June 23, having been ill for many weeks. Deceased was born in Lerdal, Norway in August 1846. He came to America with his parents when 16 years of age and the family settled on a farm in Dane county, Wisconsin. In 1869 they came to LeRoy. He was married to Miss Emma Monson in 1876 and to them were born twelve children, three of whom are dead. In 1900 the family moved to Clark county, S. D. and eight years later they moved to Mitchell county, Iowa. He retired from farm life this spring when the family returned to LeRoy to reside. Mr. Hendrickson was a kind husband and father and a good neighbor. He was a member of the West LeRoy Lutheran church. The sorrowing widow survives, also five sons and four daughters, Mrs. Lien, Henry, Herman, Mons, Mike and Emily Hendrickson, all of Le Roy, the latter four living at home; Mrs. Henry Lien of Naples, S. D.; Carl H. of Clark, S. D.; Mrs. Louis Mealman of White Butte, S. D. There are thirteen grandchildren. One brother, Kaute Iverson of LeRoy also remains.

JAMES PERCY HOGUE.
James Percy Hogue died at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Hogue living near LeRoy, June 21, after a brief illness with peritonitis. Percy was born July 19, 1908 in Earlville, Illinois. He came to Le Roy with his parents this spring. Funeral was held Tuesday, 23rd, and the remains were laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery at Riceville, Ia.

MIKE SAYSAGE.
Mike Saysage, an employee on the road, was instantly killed at Dexter Sunday afternoon. He attempted to catch a freight train passing thru the village, but his foot slipped and he fell under the wheels. Three wheels passed over his body. Coroner Pierson was called to Dexter. The deceased came from Hibbing.

Jacob Fosse, aged about 26 years, was instantly killed Sunday morning about 1 o'clock, when Nels Peterson of Sargeant ran into him with his auto. Mr. Fosse was a single man and was working around Sargeant. He had spent the day in the village celebrating the Fourth and was on his way home when the accident happened just east of Sargeant. The body was picked up and taken to his boarding place.

JULIA TILLMAN.
Julia Tillman died Friday night at St. Olaf hospital where she had been for treatment, her ailment being tuberculosis of the bone. Julia was 8 years old. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis C. Tillman. She made her home with her Aunt, Mrs. Will Farrell since the death of her mother a few months ago. She has been a patient little sufferer for some time. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. F. E. Knopf Sunday afternoon. Burial in Cedar City cemetery. The father, who is left alone, has the sympathy of all.

ARTHUR ALBERT GEMMEL.
Another of Mower County's good citizens and pioneers has passed away. Arthur Albert Gemmel died Tuesday morning at 6 o'clock at his home at Cedar City, six miles southwest of Austin. Mr. Gemmel has been in poor health for some time past, but was sick only two hours before his death which was caused from a partial stroke and heart failure. He was conscious to the last and bade his family good bye. Arthur Gemmel was born in Toronto, Canada, 58 years ago the 9th day of next September. When he was only nine months old his parents came to Minnesota settling at Cedar City and this has been the family home since. Mr. Gemmel has always lived on the family farm with the exception of a very short time. He was well known throughout the county as an honest, thrifty farmer. He leaves a wife and six children, the oldest 14 and the youngest 3 years of age. The children are Agnes, Ada, George, Albert, Helen and Kenneth. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Gemmel, also Mower county pioneers. He was the youngest son. His father was a native of Scotland and his mother of Canada. Andrew Gemmel coming to America in 1842

and settling in Cedar City in 1857. He died 15 years ago and Mrs. Gemmel died six years ago. A brother of the deceased, Andrew Gemmel, died last September. Three sisters are left of the seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Gemmel, Sr., they are, Mrs. J. E. Ingalls, Mrs. C. R. Varco, Mrs. Eaton officer, all of Austin. The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the house, Rev. Ten Brock of Christ Church officiating. Burial at Cedar City cemetery. The wife, children and sisters have the sympathy of the community.

MRS. LEVI DECKER.
Mrs. Ida Decker, wife of Levi W. Decker, died at her home on Chatham street Tuesday night, after an illness of several months duration. She has suffered greatly from nervous troubles and was much weakened as a result. The family were to leave Wednesday to visit a specialist where Mrs. Decker was to receive medical treatment and it was hoped that the change and quiet would bring relief and a much needed rest. She has been poorly some time ago. Mrs. Decker was always active, in the home as well as among her many friends. She was one of Austin's best women. She loved the home and her literary work and few were as talented as she. She was very reticent, but gave freely of her literary work to social gatherings, being a member of the Stoddard club, also the Birthday club. Ida Alberta Smith was born in New York, Sept. 5, 1863. She came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Smith, to Austin when but a little girl. She attended our school from the primary department and graduated in the Class of 1881 with the highest standing. Her death occurred on the 33rd anniversary of her graduation. She attended Pillsbury academy at Owatonna. One daughter, Evelyn, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Decker who with the husband survives, also a brother, A. M. Smith. The funeral was held from her home Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Rev. J. F. Stout officiating. Mrs. Winship and Mrs. Stewart of Owatonna classmates at Pillsbury academy came to attend the funeral also many friends of the family from Spring Valley. The sympathy of a large circle of friends is extended the family of this good woman who was so well known and loved by all who knew her.

FINED \$100.
Frank Callzari was before Justice Detwiler Monday and plead guilty to a charge of assault upon one Squire Wood, both parties coming from Mason City and both having visited the saloons too freely. Callzari stabbed Wood in the head and had a fine of \$100 imposed upon him.

PASTORS WILL APPEAL.
The adjourned term of the district court was called in Albert Lea Tuesday June 30 by Judge Kingsley of Austin and one of the church cases involving Rev. T. J. Strand is up for hearing. An action to determine who were the legally elected trustees of the West Freeborn Norwegian congregation, commonly known as the Manchester church, was tried last March. The court decided that the so-called anti-Strand forces constituted the congregation and that their trustees were the legally elected ones. A stay of proceedings, was granted until July 1. Under this stay Rev. T. J. Strand and his followers have remained in possession of the church, burial ground and parsonage. An application was made a few days ago to extend the stay pending an appeal to the supreme court. This motion was heard today. The court refused to extend the stay and judgment will now be entered ousting the Strand trustees and seating the legally elected trustees of the congregation. This ends the cases so far as the district court is concerned, against the two brothers, T. J. Strand and H. J. Strand, pastors of the five Freeborn county churches, as both have now been ousted by the court decisions. Steps are being taken by the Strand forces to appeal.
