

WILL VISIT AUSTIN

St. Paul Jobbers and Manufacturers on Annual Tour; Street Concerts by Minnesota State Band and Big Parade. Picture Show in the Evening.

About 75 prominent St. Paul jobbing and manufacturing firms will be represented in a party which will visit Austin on July 24. This will be the second excursion made by the St. Paul party this summer. The trip will be made in a special train, consisting of solid steel equipment furnished by the C. M. & St. P. Ry.

The party will arrive here at 5:35 p. m. and will remain over night. St. Paul jobbers and manufacturers make an annual feature of these tours although this is the first time in a number of years that they have come in this direction. The local merchants constantly come in contact with salesmen covering this territory for the St. Paul houses but it is seldom that they have an opportunity to meet the actual heads of the big St. Paul firms. The object of the trip is that the actual heads of the big firms may become personally acquainted with their customers throughout the territory and in this way get in personal touch with the trade and its requirements.

One of the features of the visit will be the presence with the party of the famous Minnesota State Band of more than twenty pieces under the direction of A. L. Snyder. This band will give street concerts in each town visited. Another feature of the trip will be the making of moving pictures in each town visited. A moving picture operator and a complete outfit will be carried and at each stop pictures of the town and its people will be made. On the conclusion of the trip these pictures will be returned to local moving picture theatres, that the people of the towns visited may have the opportunity of seeing themselves as the man behind the moving picture camera sees them.

The party will leave St. Paul early Monday morning, July 20th and will reach home late in the evening of Saturday July 25th. During the week nearly a thousand miles of the C. M. & St. P. Ry will be covered and stops will be made in more than eighty towns.

In the cities in which night stops are made evening band concerts and moving picture and stereopticon exhibitions will be given on some central street corner. The pictures will include views of St. Paul and the principal jobbing and manufacturing plants of the city.

One of the features of each stop will be a parade of all the members of the party headed by the band.

The towns in which stops will be made, ranging in length from a few minutes to two or three hours depending on the size of the town, are as follows:

DEATHS

ARTHUR HEILMAN.
Arthur Heilman, brother of Prof. O. C. Heilman of this city, died July 3 at Lisbon, N. D., after an illness of about two weeks. Arthur was 20 years old and last year attended the U. of S. M. here. He went to Dakota this spring. Two weeks ago he was taken seriously sick from abscess and was operated on for this trouble by a Fargo specialist, but of no avail. Prof. Heilman was called to Lisbon during his sickness. Arthur died the day after an operation. The body was brought to Glenville, the old home for burial. Funeral services were held at the church Sunday July 5 at 3 o'clock. He leaves a mother who is sick at Albert Lea hospital and four brothers, Oliver, Frank, Harry and Clinton.

ROBERT POLLOCK.
Robert Pollock of Tacoma, Wash., was killed a few days ago in an auto accident. No further particulars have been received to date. Mr. Pollock was a carpenter by trade. He lived on a farm near Oakland but moved west about twenty years ago. He is a brother-in-law of Robert Guy, Sr., of this city.

TOMMENE OLSON.
Mrs. N. Olson, 51 years of age died at her home on Courtland avenue Wednesday evening. Deceased was born in Stavanger, Norway, and came to America with her parents when only three years old. They settled at West Union, Ia., where she was married to N. Olson in 1884 and this was their home until two years ago when they moved to Austin. There are nine children living: Carrie and Hans of Coeur de Alene, Idaho; Oscar, Mrs. John Thorson, Hardy, Hilda, Gertrude, Josie and Fritz of this city. A short service was held at the house Friday morning, conducted by Rev. Knopf. The body was taken to the old home at West Union, Iowa, for burial.

CATHERINE BOYLE.
A sad death occurred Friday evening when Catherine, the 12 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Boyle passed away after only a half day's illness. She and a number of her playmates went wading in Dobbin's Creek in the afternoon. It was a very hot day and soon after going into the water the little girl complained of feeling sick. She came to shore and fell exhausted. The child was taken home and a doctor called who did all he could to relieve her. Other physicians were also called, but she died at 8:45. Catherine was born in Austin, Sept. 2, 1902. She was a favorite child and a bright scholar. Funeral services were held Monday morning from the home on Railway street at 9 o'clock and from St. Augustine's church at 9:30. The parents, and three sisters have the heartfelt sympathy of all in this sad hour.

MRS. DENNIS O'MARRO.
Mrs. Dennis O'Marro, died Wednesday morning at her home after a short illness with Bright's disease. She would have been 26 years old on the 5th of September. Juliette E. Wall was born in Etrick, Wis., 1880. Her parents moved to Elkton, S. D., when she was about 12 years old

and eight years ago they moved to this city. Deceased graduated from the high school in 1906, the same spring she came to Austin. On June 22, 1909 she was married to Dennis O'Marro, who with a daughter three years old is left to mourn a cheerful, loving wife and mother. She leaves also her mother, Mrs. M. E. Wall and sister, Mrs. Loretta Johnson of Sioux City, Iowa, beside four brothers, George, William, Elijah and Ed. Wall. A sister Margaret Wall died about four years ago after a long illness. Mrs. O'Marro was a member of the Rosary society, also of the Yeoman lodge. The funeral was held Friday morning from St. Augustine's church. Many relatives from away were present at the funeral.

MEREDITH MAY ZIMMERMAN.
Meredith May Zimmerman, born July 3, died Thursday, July 9 between three and four in the morning. The parents have the sympathy of all in their affliction. The funeral was held Thursday afternoon with burial in Lansing cemetery.

GLADYS PINKAVA.
Little Gladys Pinkava, 8 years old, died Sunday night at the Wanus farm in Red Rock, where she lived with her father. She had been sick but a short time following an operation on the knee. She had been struck with a neckyoke while at play and the next day was unable to walk. Gladys lost her mother four years ago. Her father, James Pinkava is left with two daughters. GEORGE W. CRUICKSHANK.
George W. Cruickshank, living at his father's home in Red Rock, fell from a hay rake in some manner Friday afternoon and died almost instantly. His face was badly mangled and the skull crushed. He fell in front of the rake and was dragged across the field, where he had been at work. George was 15 years old and a bright promising young man. His sad death is a blow to the parents, brothers and sisters. The funeral was held Monday from the home.

GEORGE BAUDLER.
George Baudler, one of Austin's best known and respected citizens died very suddenly Sunday afternoon, at his home southwest of Austin. Mr. Baudler has always been an active, hard-working man and for several months past has suffered from a nervous breakdown. He was a native of New York being born at Pittsfield, November 23, 1850. George was 5 years old when he came with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Baudler to Mower county, settling just north of the William Baudler farm, where Oakwood cemetery now is. July 3, 1881 he was married to Bertha Thompson who survives also a daughter Mabel. His father died a few months ago and his mother died in 1902. Four sister are living; Miss Emma Baudler, Mrs. Sam Culdice and Mrs. Charles Barnitz all of Austin and Mrs. Henry Edgerton of Turtle Lake, N. Dak. For many years Mr. and Mrs. Baudler have conducted the large truck farm. Six years ago he gave charge of his business to his brother-in-law Sam Culdice and Mr. and Mrs. Baudler made an extended visit to Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Germany, but about three years ago he again took up his favorite work. The funeral will be held from the house this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and from the Lutheran church at 3 o'clock. The casket will be open at the house but not at the church.
