An Inherent Privilege.

The charge made in certain quarters to the effect that those who favor a state convention for the purpose of selecting candidates for state positions are opposed to the primary law and work for its repeal, has little foundation. What is wanted is a modification, to make it possible to keep up party organizations. A republican form of government necessarily leads to party organizations, without which the reigns of government would soon revert into the hands of the few, with the masses reduced to a mere cipher. Perhaps this is what is wanted by the parties opposed to a modification of the primary law in its present shape, in order to retain their undue advantages, made possible by that law, although never intended by its framers. The public at large however, has no intention to sanction such a scheme and at first opportunity will take good care to give the law the necessary elasticity to insure popular government. It is really absurd to hold that a given constituency has no legal right to convene and discuss and agree upon candidates and policies they desire to support, and they never will consent to having this right taken away. The principle of a non-partisan election law aims to insure to every individual voter the privilege of casting his vote unhampered by party restrictions, but it does not contain the elements of a sacrifice of an inherent privilege—the right of free speech in public meeting. Eliminate the objectionable features in the present law and the talked of repeal will quickly lose its force.—St. Peter Free Press.
