### DROWNED

#### DR. A. P. SARGEANT LOSES LIFE WITH GIRL HE ATTEMPTS TO SAVE. BOAT IS OVERTURNED.

Dr. Arthur Parker, Sargeant and Miss Frances Renter of Carlos, Minn., seven miles north of Alexandria, were drowned last Wednesday evening while swimming in Lake Carlos two miles west of that village. They were of a party of four who had gone out in a boat to swim, one of the other two being Frank Renter a brother of the drowned girl. One of the men jumped from the boat, upsetting it, and throwing the remaining three into the lake. Dr. Sargeant, who was a good swimmer, attempted to save Miss Renter and once placed her in the boat. She fell back into the lake and it is supposed, the two went down together, the drowned girl clinging to the doctor. Their bodies later were found together in seven feet of water. No pulmotor available. The brother and the fourth member of the party, a man who could not swim, reached shore and gave the alarm. The bodies were recovered within a half hour but doctors summoned from Alexandria could not revive them, although they worked two hours over the bodies. Miss Renter was 23 years of age, a clerk in Renter Brothers store at Carlos. Dr. Sargeant had only recently located in Carlos, his home was at Northfield, Minn. He was a graduate of the Stewartville high school, of Carleton college and the medical college of the University of Minnesota, class of 1913. Dr. Arthur Parker Sargeant was born at the old Sargeant homestead in the Northeastern part of Sargeant township on the 22d day of May, 28 years ago. He was in the prime of life for his profession which he had so ably fitted himself, when he was taken away. It was remarked by a classmate at college that his last act was characteristic of his whole life, always thinking of others before himself. He had located at Carlos, Minn. last April, and has a very good practice with such a bright future before him. He was a young man of the highest type of manhood, had united with the Methodist church early in life. He was the second son of Harry A. and Anna Johnson-Sargeant, one of a family of seven sons, three little brothers had preceded him to the better land. His father, mother and three brothers are left to mourn; N. J. Sargeant, living on the old homestead; Howard L., a student of the medical department of the University of Minnesota; and Willard H., a young boy residing with his parents at Northfield, Minnesota. His body was taken to his old home at Northfield, Minn., where a service was held and from there to Stewartville, Minn., where it was interred in the High Forest cemetery beside those of his family who had gone before. He had planned soon to take a life partner who is at present a nurse in one of the city hospitals. His six uncles, the Johnson brothers all of Johnson County, one of them R. L. Mower of Austin; H. F. Kezar of Sargeant, were present at the funeral. Dr. Sargeant always had the best of health until two years ago last winter when he had a run of typhoid fever and was in the hospital for twelve weeks, but recovered and finished his year's work, his sickness leaving his heart weak. Another young life is taken and the sympathy of the many friends in this locality is extended to the parents and relatives.
