TWINE PRICES.
Prices for the 1915 product of state prison binding twine, which are generally lower than in 1914 were announced today by the state board of control as follows: Standard and white sisal, 500 feet to the pound, 7 cents; manila, 600 feet to the pound 9 1/2 cents; pure manila, 650 feet to the pound 11 cents. The price of standard and white sisal is 3-4 of a cent lower than in 1914, that of manila is 1/2 cent lower and pure manila the same. The board has sold 20,000,000 pounds of the 1915 product and will manufacture in all 21,000,000 pounds. It was announced. Last year's production was 18,000,000 pounds.
