MAGNUS HENDRICKSON.

Magnus Hendrickson was born in Sweden, March 23, 1845. He died Sunday, May 9th, 1915 at 12:30 p. m. at the age of seventy years. Mr. Hendrickson came to this country when a young man and located in Illinois. In 1869 he was married at Quincy, Illinois to Miss Marie Magnuson, who came from his home town in Sweden. Six children were born to this couple, four boys and two girls.

Mr. Hendrickson was a shoemaker by trade and engaged in this business at Roseville, Ill., in 1870 and remained there until the fall of 1885 when he moved to Keithsburg, Illinois. There he again established himself in the shoe business. In the spring of 1908 he came to Minnesota and finally located at Blooming Prairie where he has been in the general merchandise business for the past four years.

His wife died in 1901 at Keithsburg and for the past four years he made his home with his son. Only two sons survive to mourn his loss. Fred, a business man of Denver, Colorado, and Victor Hendrickson who has been a partner with his father in the mercantile business here. He was a devoted Christian. He was a member of the M. W. A. for twenty-five years.
