THE PRE-EMPTION LAW

1. The settler must never before have had the benefit of pre-emption under the act. 2. He must not, at the time of making the pre-emption, be the owner of 320 acres of land in any State or Territory of the United States. 3. He must settle on and improve the land in good faith, for his own exclusive use and benefit, and not with the intention of selling it on speculation; and must not make, direct or indirectly, any contract or agreement, in any way or manner, with any person or persons, by which the title which he may acquire of the United States should inure, in whole or in part, to the benefit of any person except himself. 4. He must be twenty-one years of age and a citizen of the United States; or if a foreigner, he must have declared his intention to become a citizen, before the pre-emption authority, and receive a certificate to that effect. 5. He must build a house on the land, live on it, and make it his exclusive home; and must be a resident of the same at the time of making the pre-emption. (Until a single man might build with his nearest neighbor, but the same is not required in the case of a married man, except that the settler is married, his family must also be in the house.) 6. The law requires that more or less improvements be made on the land, such as breaking, fencing, &c.; but pre-emptions are granted where a half-acre is broken and enclosed. 7. It is necessary that no other person entitled to pre-emption, reside upon the land at the same time. 8. No one is permitted to remove from his own land and make pre-emption in the same State or Territory. 9. The settler is required to bring with him to the Land Office a written or printed application, setting forth the facts of his case, and the 1st, 2d and 3d requisites here mentioned, and a certificate appended, to be signed by the register and receiver, and made affidavit to the same. 10. He is also required to bring with him a certificate of his settlement, which is known to the fact of his settlement, to make amount to the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th requirements here mentioned, with the same forth on paper, with a corresponding blank certificate attached, to be signed by the land officers. 11. The pre-emptor, if a foreigner, must bring with him to the land office, duplicates of his naturalization papers, duly signed by the official from whom they were received. A minor who is the head of a family, or a widow, may also pre-empt, their families being required to live on the land. The settler is required to file a written declaratory statement of the intention to pre-empt, before he can proceed with his pre-emption. FEE—1st. The fee required by the register, for filing a declaratory statement, is one dollar. 2d. For granting a pre-emption the register and receiver can receive fifty cents.

All men are created free, and equal in their right of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. 3d. The Bible, and the Constitution of the United States are anti-slavery; and human chattelhood is unconstitutional in any association professing to receive either as fundamental laws. 4th. Paying taxes is an unwarrantable, as voting; and is a privilege which should be exclusively confined to "white male citizens, of 21 and other countries," until women share with them the responsibility of saying what shall be done with the money they are required to contribute to the public treasury. 5th. Slavery, Intemperance, Affectation, "ge ignorance, Idleness, Languor, envy and Large "ities are the seven great evils which curse the East; and a multitude of misers as more wonderful than the "seven wonders of the world; and they must be abolished by one to reign of peace on earth and good will to men can be fully established. 6th. St. Cloud, in despite of all we could do to prevent, will, at no distant day, be a large city; and it is our duty now, to do what we can in laying the foundations for as much of the good, and building defences against as much, as possible, of the evil attending these boards of crippled humanity. 7th. Our motto is the true philosophy of life. Be sure you have turned your face to liberty and light, your back to the bondage; and the feet-point of Egypt. Look straight towards the better land and to the greatest amount of good you can accomplish on the journey. Then—"go forward!" What! into the Red Sea of "oil, of danger and apparent death!" Yes! If the path of duty lies through the deep waters, "go forward!" and the irresistible right arm shall divide the waves—Amen and Amen.
