SUMMARY OF THE GENERAL NEWS.

Death of a Distinguished Minnesotan.

Hon. James C. Braden, Register of the Beason, Swift Co. Land Office (formerly located at Litchfield Minn.) died on the 9th inst. at San Antonio, Texas, where he had gone a few weeks before in hopes that the milder climate of that State would repair his wasted health and energy. On his first arrival there, it appeared as if he was likely to be greatly benefited, but the result showed, this was but a delusive hope, only too commonly indulged in by the victims of that fell destroyer, Consumption. Mr. Braden was born in Ohio in 1835 and came West some twenty years ago, settling in Houston and afterwards removing to Fillmore county. In 1862 he was appointed Lieutenant of Volunteers and assigned to duty in the Tenth Regiment. After the Indian campaign of 1863, he went south with the regiment and became Assistant Provost Marshal of the Department of Missouri. Eight years ago he was appointed Register of the Land Office at Litchfield which position he held at the time of his death. Mr. Braden was a member of the Grand Lodge of Masons at the time of his death, and on the arrival of the remains at St. Paul, will be escorted to Litchfield and there interred under the auspices of the Order.

Review of Larch Express.

The Mark Lane Express's weekly review of the corn trade says, "In spite of heavy imports of foreign wheat and the absence of speculation, trade seems to possess an inherent strength. It is worthy of note that exports of wheat during the past six weeks were nearly 45,000 quarters, and should the petition of French millers and merchants be granted with respect to the tax on wheat imported from this country, a much larger outward movement may confidently be looked for, to supplement the acknowledged deficiency of French cereal crops. In spite of the dullness of trade, holders evinced little disposition to press sales and prices have undergone but a trifling change. Russian wheat has occasionally given way, six pence to a shilling a quarter, but American remains firm and while sorts generally maintained their values. A decidedly strong tone has been apparent in maize, of which imports continue light, and further rise in this valuable feeding stuff appears imminent; sound corn on spot almost exhausted and 31s. 6d. for 480 pounds from the granary. The market remains firm and a number of youngsters of the small-bay species, who hang around the city front, and occasionally, when opportunity offers, throw stones at Chinamen landing and going up town. Such occurrences took place on the night of the 8th, when the police in attendance at the dock observed them, chased them away and administered whippings to two or three of them. Young Heavens' Betings.

A Secretary of Justice Profane.

Judge Dean, of Hot Sulphur Springs, Colorado, reports his court broken up by a mob. Half a dozen men entered the court peacefully and having arranged themselves to suit their purpose, the reader, said to be deputy sheriff chief, began to read what purported to be a warrant commanding Judge Dean to disperse his so-called court, and to deliver up his books and seal. Dean commanded him to sit down and threatened to place him under arrest, laying his hand upon his shoulder. Just then a man struck back at the judge with a revolver, and a second man shot at Dean, and although revolvers were held at his head, Dean succeeded in locking up the records and seals. He is on his way to Denver to ask the Governor to assist in restoring order. With such a mob hounding him he dares not open court.

Educational Exhibit at Paris.

The department of superintendence of the national educational association reassembled in Washington on the 12th. The committee on the representation of our educational interests in the Paris exposition report on the advisability of requesting the President to appoint as one of the hired commissioners a competent scientific expert in matters of education to organize and take charge of the educational exhibit of the United States, and also to appoint a fair proportion of honorary commissioners with reference to this purpose. The report also recommended that an effort be made to obtain a share of the congressional appropriation for this purpose, and suggested that if the measure above indicated should fail, no creditable educational display could be made at the exhibition.

Appeal of a State Honor.

In submitting to the legislature the correspondence from parties representing a very large number of Tennessee bonds, expressing a willingness to take fifty cents on a compromise of the State debt, Gov. Porter concludes his message as follows: "I appeal to the general assembly to rescue the State from its peril and to preserve something of its credit. The people of Tennessee are not prepared to renounce the full freedom of reputation. They are still sensible of the responsibility resting on them of maintaining the good name impressed upon the State by so many of her sons. The time has been when the prestige of Tennessee, the high standard of her commercial credit, made all of her sons proud of their nativity. Do not let us turn our backs upon this honorable history.

Restoring the Use of Trade Dollars.

Information having reached the treasury department that shipment of trade dollars are being made from San Francisco to east of the Rocky mountains for domestic circulation, instructions were sent to the Pacific coast mint to receive the silver for re-minting in trade dollars only in cases where the coin shall be actually required and intended for export to other countries. If this restriction should prevent sending trade dollars east for domestic use it is probable the receipt of bullion for coinage into trade dollars will be intermitted for a time.

License or no License.

Judge Davis of New York has an-

nounced his decision in the matter of the habeas corpus to procure the release of Barker French. He said after giving the case the most careful consideration in his power, he had come to the conclusion to dismiss the writ and remand the prisoner. This saw a test case, and the judge in his decision says that the receipt given by the excise board in no sense a license, and that the "three spare beds" do not constitute an inn without other accommodations furnished at a hotel.

The Great Middings Parlor Suit.

In the United States Supreme Court on the 11th the motion was called up to vacate the decree of the supreme court in the case of Cochrane vs. Deener, the celebrated suit under the four middings patent, on the ground that prior to the argument in the supreme court in 1876 the appellants had an understanding with the appellees, by which the case was virtually settled, and the argument presented in behalf of defendants was, in consequence meager and insufficient, and hence the court was led to decide in favor of the validity of the patent. The result of this motion is of vast importance to the flour and milling interests of the country.

Fighting in Texas.

Advices from Austin, Tex., say there was fighting all day on the 13th at San Elezario in El Paso county, Texas, between Mexicans from both sides of the Rio Grande, and Texas State troops. Gov. Hubbard has telegraphed to President Hayes for help, there being but twenty of the State troops at San Elezario, and no other State forces within several hundred miles. The whole country of El Paso is Mexican, and a rival posse cannot be raised.

No More Troops For Texas.

At the cabinet session on the 11th the secretary of war had nothing to present regarding affairs on the Rio Grande. It is not probable that any troops will be ordered to Texas at present in addition to those designated for duty in that department, but companies from Minnesota, Carlisle barracks and other points that have been ordered to that section, will be likely to have reinforcements from recruiting stations as may be required.

The First of the Year.

The election for senator in Beaufort county, South Carolina, which includes several sea islands, containing a large negro population took place on the 10th. Notwithstanding a vigorous Democratic canvass, J. W. Collins, Republican candidate, is elected by a 1,500 majority. This is the first election in this State this year, which has been carried by the Republicans.

Prussian Finances.

The Economist says the subscription to the new issue of 2,500,000 pounds of Prussian four per cent. consols at 93 1/2 which week shows that as much as 257,000,000 marks was applied for. A German national loan of 2,500,000 pounds is stated to be in preparation for funding the treasury bills which have been put in circulation for the purpose of carrying the currency reform through.

Satisfactory Indian Council.

Several Cheyenne Indian chiefs held a satisfactory consultation with General Sheridan in which they expressed a desire to remain with General Miles and assist him in case of an Indian outbreak in the spring. They were, however, informed that they must move to their reservation in Indian territory early in April.

Mutilating the Smaller Fry.

A San Francisco dispatch says that President Orton, of the Western Union telegraph company states that an agreement has been reached by the Western Union and Central Pacific authorities by which all telegraph lines of the railroad company are to be consolidated with the Western Union system.

Impeachment Proceedings Dismissed.

Henry McVey has been re-elected as associate justice of the supreme court of South Carolina by a unanimous vote of the legislature, Democrats and Republicans. There will also be an election for associate justice in the place of Wright, colored, resigned. Impeachment proceedings against Wright have been dismissed.

A New Cabinet Demanded.

Since the defeat of the administration on the New York appointments, letters and telegrams in immense numbers demand the reconstruction of the cabinet. It appears from these letters that Everts and Schurz are especially obnoxious. Their departure from the cabinet has been demanded by influential Republicans in not less than twenty-five States.

One More Unfortunate.

In the executive session of the Senate the nomination of Samuel B. McLin, a former associate justice of the supreme court of New Mexico, was reported from the judiciary committee unfavorably and rejected without roll call. Senator Conover was one of its most earnest opponents.

Commissioner General to Paris.

Richard C. McCormick of Arizona, has been nominated by the President as commissioner general to represent the United States at the International Industrial Exposition at Paris.

The True Story of Mazepa.

In the Church of St. Mary, Galatz, Roumania, is to be seen the tomb of Mazepa, the famous hetman of the Cossacks, immortalized by Byron. His adventures, sung by the bard, were in reality much more commonplace than as we have learned to know them. Mazepa was a young Cossack of the Ukraine, who, having been ennobled by the Russians, declined to pay his taxes. For this the local governor, Count Talboski, ordered him to be stripped naked by his servants and tied to the back of his horse, with his head to the animal's tail. The horse was then flogged, pistols were discharged close to his ears, and after being thus excited he was turned loose. The road leading to Mazepa's house was a bridge-

path leading through the woods, which were particularly fertile in thorn bushes and wild pear trees, and the infuriated beast, accustomed to follow this route, dashed off as soon as he was at liberty homeward, where his master arrived very much the worse for his journey. He had, however, enough strength left to call for the gate-keeper, who recognized his voice and opened the door, to close it immediately to keep out what he supposed to be Mazepa's ghost. At last other servants, recovering from their fear, came to his assistance and put him to bed where he remained some months between life and death from the injuries he had received. When he recovered he exiled himself voluntarily to Poland, and joining himself to the fortunes of Charles XII., was mortally wounded at Paltowa, and, dying at Baranah his body was brought to and buried at Galatz.

RUSSIA'S WAR WITH TURKEY.

Special advices from Bucharest put the number of Turkish prisoners taken at Plevna at 40,000 and the number of guns captured at 400. The ground which was the scene of the heroic defense, was literally strewn with dead and dying. Osman Pasha himself was wounded before he would consent to surrender. His valor, which is described as desperate, is everywhere the theme of conversation. The sufferings of the Turks in the beleaguered town were actually awful. Cold, disease and famine decimated the ranks and reduced the soldiers to living skeletons. To aggravate the sufferings there was no doctor, and no medicine could be obtained.

The Russian official account of the capture of Plevna confirms the details already telegraphed. It says that the Turks fought lions. Seven Pashas were captured. The counting of prisoners and trophies is not yet completed. The emperor was present on the 13th at a thanksgiving service held on the 13th of the former headquarters of Osman Pasha. A grand council was held on the 12th at the war office in Constantinople. It is said it was resolved on to the last extremity.

According to official returns, the Russian losses in the fighting preceding the surrender of Plevna were ten officers and 182 men killed, and forty-five officers and 1,207 men wounded. The Turks lost 4,000 killed and wounded, and the prisoners include ten Pashas, 128 staff officers, 3,000 infantry and 1,200 cavalry. Seventy-seven cannons were also captured. The first batch of prisoners, numbering 10,000, have already started for Bucharest.

The London Times' correspondent at Plevna telegraphs: Grand Duke Nicholas told me Osman Pasha reported his force at 27,000. At the same time the Grand Duke seemed doubtful if there were so many. About sixty cannon and many hundred wagons were among the trophies. Osman Pasha had three weeks provisions still on hand, and ten army's rations in his transport train for the whole army. The immediate cause of his abandoning the entrenchments was the breaking out of an epidemic among the troops. There were forty or fifty dead bodies a day in Plevna. The men were unable to bury them, and the mortality was increasing. Eight hundred sick and wounded are in the hospitals.

A correspondent at Plevna telegraphs concerning Osman Pasha's reception by the Russians. The Grand Duke Nicholas rode up to Osman's carriage, and for some seconds the two gazed into each other's faces without uttering a word. The Grand Duke then stretched out his hand, shook the Grand Duke Osman Pasha heartily, and said, "I compliment you on your defense of Plevna. It is one of the most splendid military feats in history." Osman smiled sadly, rose painfully to his feet in spite of his wound, and said something which I could not hear. He then returned himself. The Russian officers all cried " bravo, bravo," and all saluted him. There was not one among them who did not gaze on the hero of Plevna with the greatest admiration and sympathy. Prince Charles, of Roumania, who arrived, rode up and repeated almost every word of the grand duke and likewise shook hands with Osman. The Grand Duke looked at this time in grim silence. He wore a loose black cloak with no apparent mark on it to designate his rank, and red fez. He is a large strongly built man. The lower part of his face is covered with a short black beard without a streak of grey, and he has a large Roman nose and black eyes. It is a grand face exclaimed Col. Galliard, French military attaché. I was almost afraid to see him, for my expectations were disappointed, but he more than fulfilled my ideal. It is the face of a great military chieftain. Said young Skobeleff, "I am glad to have seen him. Osman Ghazi is, and Osman the victorious he will remain in spite of his surrender."
