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General Miles Vindicated.

The story of excessive cruelty charged upon Gen. Miles in his attack upon the Banook Indians is fully answered in the following private letter:

Bruno Bannock, Boston, Nov. 5, 1878.—

I send to you a cutting from one of the morning papers which does great injustice to one of the most gallant officers of our army, and if not contradicted, might do him a serious injury in the minds of his countrymen. Having accompanied a body of cavalry which joined Gen. Miles the morning after his fight, and knowing the preceding movements of the troops toward the body of Banooks, who were making their path toward the British possessions by burned ranches and murdered families, I feel it my duty to say that the Banooks accompanied by scouts came to Gen. Miles with propositions to surrender. The information of their presence came from Capt. Egan, Second Cavalry, who was following them in an easterly direction. After an arduous march, with one of his horses killed, and another maimed, he was met by the Banooks, who were making their path toward the British possessions by burned ranches and murdered families, I feel it my duty to say that the Banooks accompanied by scouts came to Gen. 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
