Folger has been prominent citizen of New York for many years, but his name was never conspicuous in national politics until last year, when he was urged upon President Garfield for secretary of the treasury. Cornell appointed Judge Folger to the place, and chose Francis M. Fitch of Ithaca as his successor. At the next election the choice of the governor was ratified by the people. and Folger was elected to the full judicial term of fourteen years. He has always been a staunch Republican, but, preferring jurisprudence to politics, has never actively allied himself with either faction.-When Gen. Garfield was making up his cabinet last year, the Conkling interest pushed Folger strongly for the treasury position. He has never asserted his own claims, however, and
