THE NOMINATIONS.

The nomination of President Harrison was generally expected, but the strong majority with which it was carried was not looked for, after the resignation of Mr. Blaine was announced, and his active candidacy no longer concealed. It is greatly to be regretted that such personal competitions had not been conducted in a better spirit and a wiser way. The prospect now is that the Republican party will prosecute the campaign with vigor and with as much unanimity as is usually had after contests of this sort. The 65 millions of people in this country move in the path of their convictions and preferences without regard to the disappointed ambitions of individuals. So, if any of our leading politicians conclude to "sulk in their tents" as the phrase is, or show splenetic feeling, they will do more harm to themselves than to any one else. The people want good government and not to become bond-servants to any man or set of men. Then the great majority of those who opposed Harrison's nomination are sincere and earnest in their devotion to the party and its principles. Besides, the opposition party has its domestic troubles to cause it an equal amount of embarrassment and weakness.

The nomination of Whitelaw Reid for Vice President is received with general approval. There is a rumor that opposition will be made to him by labor organizations because of a controversy the Printer's Union had, some years ago, with the Tribune. As we remember that controversy, it was a general strike, in which several New York journals were involved, which occurred while Mr. Reid was abroad. Our recollection is that Mr. Reid telegraphed to his business manager to advance the wages of the Tribune's compositors to fifty cents per thousand, a higher rate than the strikers demanded. There were, probably, other demands of the strikers to which the Tribune did not at that time accede. But, whatever the substance of that controversy was, it belongs to the past and can hardly have a vital resurrection.

There is every prospect that the coming campaign will be a very industrious and exciting one. The strength of both parties will be in the fight. The ephemeral parties will, of course, bristle up with some show of importance, but the strong wave of the great excitement will sweep on as though they did not exist. They will, each of them, be numerically weaker at the end of the campaign than they were at the beginning. Self-seeking men in these organizations, to advance personal ends, will try to combine two or more weak parties together, or rather submerge within or into a stronger party, their weaker ones. This always disintegrates the weaker organization. The lamb somehow gets inside the lion, in such cases. Then, such is the number and diverse character of the minor parties, that they will, altogether, draw about as many votes from one of the great parties as they will from the other. So the great parties will be matched about as they would be if the weaker parties did not exist.

The platform announced is clear, practical and patriotic. There are in it no rotten planks. Very properly the kindly feeling of a majority of the party is expressed on a number of topics that are not now, and which may never be, live or practical issues in national politics. But the main issues, the tariff, judiciously arranged for protection of home industries, sound legislation such as shall maintain in equal proportion the purchasing power of the gold, silver and paper dollar; and the administration of equal and exact justice to all men, irrespective of race, class, or nationality, are well stated. The platform expresses the convictions and purposes of the party with clearness and force.

NOTICE TO THE TRAVELING PUBLIC.

On and after June 1, 1892, all single trip tickets will be limited to expire one day from date of sale, and will be accepted on trains only for continuous passage to be commenced within the one day from date of sale.
Round trip tickets will be limited to expire for going passenger one day from date of sale, and returning coupons will be limited to expire thirty days from date of sale. Both going and returning coupons of round trip tickets will be good for continuous passage, if passage is commenced on or before date of expiration.
Tickets to tickets to points on other roads, when not limited through to destination, will be limited to continuous passage over C., St. P., M. & O. Ry. Stop-over checks will not be issued, nor stop-over privileges be granted, on the C., St. P., M. & O. Ry., on any class of ticket.
